Where Girl Lindbergh Landed

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29—Although Burry Port, Wales, a village of 2600 inhabitants, was the landing place of the "Friendship" the airplane in which Miss Earhart crossed the Atlantic, it was to Llanelli, three miles farther within Burry Inlet that the transatlantic flyers looked for a renewed supply of fuel. A bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic Society, "From Llanelli's telegraph office, also, came most of the news stories of the landing. Burry Port and Llanelli are two of Wales' most important shipping points for steam coal, the site of a passing age. Had the plane flown ten miles farther across a narrow peninsula, it would have come to rest more appropriately in Swansea harbor, at a port which is one of the principle seats of Great Britain's great petroleum refining industry. A flight of 110 miles beyond Burry Port and Llanelli would have taken the plane to Southampton, the original objective. California Gold Loses Lure

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The glitter of the gold of California has dimmed since the days of '49. Since the gold rush days nearly two billion dollars worth of the yellow metal has been wrung from the rocks and sands of this state, and miners say the surface has only been scratched. Nevertheless, production has slowly declined until in 1926 it was a little less than \$12,000,000, as compared to the peak of \$81,000,000 reached three years after the "Forty-Niners" with pick and shovel left comfortable homes steady in the East and hit the westward trail that for many led to slaughter at the hands of Indians or death from starvation and exposure. California, however, remains the leading gold producing state, having produced about one-fourth of the national total for 1926. The 1927 output was 544,585 fine ounces, worth \$11,871,078. Almost all the mining is in northern California, where some 800 there has grown up a huge refining industry. Much of the north shore of Burry Inlet, near which the plane came to rest, is a desolate appearing stretch of sand hills interspersed with mounds. The inlet is reasonably well protected and in general a good landing place for a plane equipped with provisions, as was Miss Earhart's.
