TILDEN AND NET STARS OF FRANCE WIN HARD SETS

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 30.—(AP)—Three of the most bitter five-set battles the great crowds of Wimbledon have ever seen today put Bill Tilden, ace of American courts, and two of France's triumvirate, Rene Lacoste and Jean Borotra, into the "final eight" of the unofficial world singles championships.

In marked contrast to the fierce strife on the men's courts, Miss Helen Wills, now definitely accepted as "cannonball" to her British public, dropped three "courtesy" games to Miss M. Holyoeroff Watson, stalwart of the women, before settling into stride and qualifying for the semi-finals of the women's singles by scores of 6-3, 6-9.

British crowds seldom have seen Tilden so worried as he was today in eliminating Pierre Landry, the young Frenchman, 6-4, 2-6, 6-1, 6-4. Rarely, too, has Lacoste, French stylist and American champion, faced a game that matched his own and bothered him so much, as that of Austin, the Englishman. Lacoste won only after Austin virtually collapsed in the final set from exhaustion, losing by scores of 6-1, 6-4, 6-8, 1-6, 6-2.

Only after a terrific struggle was Jean Borotra, third of the French mucketeers, able to repulse the designated stroking of another youth, Pat Crawford of Australia. And again the verdict rested on the outcome of the fifth set, with the bounding Lacoste at the courts triumphant, 3-6, 6-4, 6-2, 7-9, 6-3.

Sentencia Eila de Alvarez of Spain, the only woman player the experts believe can give Miss Wills even an interesting engagement, was started into a device set by Miss L. Hickerson, the competitor of Mrs. Molla Mallory, before winning, 9-7, 6-4.

NEW YORK, June 30.—(AP)—A two weeks' vacation has been granted to Eddie Roush to permit a torn muscle in the star outfielder's abdomen to heal, John J. McGraw announced here tonight. Roush disappeared from the Giants' hotel in Philadelphia a week ago, and the secretary of the club, after first trying to make a secret of the affair, announced that the player had been "suspended for breaking the club rules."

A specialist examined Roush this afternoon and advised a complete rest for two weeks. The suspension of the player remains a mystery, though it is commonly believed that he had a disagreement with Roger Bresnahan, manager pro tem of the Giants.

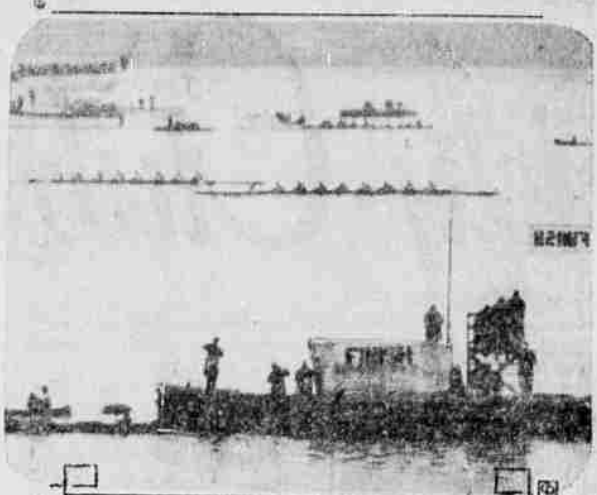
The suspension lasted five days.

VAN WINKLE HOLDS TINY CRAFTS IN "BANCO CORP." ATLANTIC RACE IN STATE EXEMPT SAIL FOR SPAIN

SALEM, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—As long as the newly Oregon Incorporation and West Coast Incorporation are merely holding companies, while the actual banking business is carried on by the banks themselves, the "Bancorporation" are not doing a banking business, hence are not subject to the supervision of the state banking department.

This is the opinion of Attorney General VanWinkle in an opinion to Mark D. McCallister, state corporation commissioner, with whom the incorporations filed their articles instead of with the banking department.

The holding companies are merely stocks and not really bank operators. It was held, and the banks and not their stockholders are liable to the double liability provision of the state constitution.

The opinion holds the use of the letters "bank" in the corporate names does not throw the holding companies in violation of the banking law.

The opinion further states that as long as the holding company are engaged in the banking business they cannot be considered as operating branch banks.

The questions answered by the attorney general for the corporation commissioner were prepared by A. A. Schramm, superintendent of banks. Schramm received a copy of the opinion soon after noon but has not yet read it and could give no comment.

NEW YORK, June 30.—(AP)—Four modern Columbus with full sails set on their trim little yachts started today in a 2,000-mile race to Santander, Spain. Tonight and tomorrow across the air paths lie a thunder storm and a stiff southwest gale.

On one of the boats was a woman—Mrs. William Ross of Pelham Manor, N. Y., who shipped on her husband's Isabella as a deck hand.

Paul Hammond's 58-foot Nina of New York was first to cross the starting line off Ambrose channel lights at 12:15 p. m.

William J. Curtis and J. Linton Riggs' 57-foot Pinta of New York was second, closely followed by Paul's 52-foot Isabella of Boston.

The Mohawk, set her sails in an area quickly passed the other two.

The Isabella, the smallest of the fleet—56 feet over all—did not get away until an hour and 15 minutes after the others.

The Spanish ambassador with Commander J. P. Morgan on the Moroccan yacht Corsair saw the tiny racers slip off into the haze and over the horizon.

The gallant fleet of four boats, competing for Queen Victoria's golden cup, is only the forerunner of another division of larger yachts which sail a week from today for King Alfonso's cup.

MANAGUA, June 30.—(AP)—The conservative party continued deadlocked today over its nominee for president. It was believed that the fractious selections of a presidential candidate could only be effected by the national election board, of which General Frank R. McCoy is the chairman.

RYE, N. Y., June 30.—(AP)—Maurice McCarthy, Georgetown university star, defeated Johnny Roberts at Yare two up and one to play today in the 36-hole final round match for the national intercollegiate golf championship at the Apawamis club.

McCarthy, the first representative of Georgetown ever to win the title, vanquished Roberts after a tense and sensational match in which the Yale star had fought his way up to even terms at the 47th hole. McCarthy succeeds Watts Gunn of Georgia Tech as title holder.

DETROIT, Mich., June 30.—(AP)—Morgan Taylor, 1924 Olympic hurdling champion, competing under the colors of the Illinois Athletic club, smashed the world's record for the 400-meter hurdles in this afternoon when he cleared the sticks in 53.1 seconds.

Taylor's performance clipped 7 to 10 of a second from the mark held by Stannard, Peterson and Sweet. He won the race from six yards over James of the University of Michigan.

PHILADELPHIA, June 30.—(AP)—Julius Seligson, Lehigh university sophomore, today won the intercollegiate lawn tennis championship by defeating in the final round Ben Gurechakoff of Occidental college. The scores were 11-9, 6-9, 9-7.

RYE, N. Y., June 30.—(AP)—Maurice McCarthy, Jr., of Georgetown university won the national intercollegiate golf championship today by defeating Johnny Roberts of Yale, two up and one to play in the 36-hole final after being held to a deadlock at the end of 27 holes.

The stocks, long driving 21-year-old son of the golf professional at the Old Flatbush club in Brooklyn thus became the first Georgetown student ever to scale the heights of intercollegiate golf supremacy.

Roberts, who hails from Ulica, barely guide the six-man team that came here to represent his college. He had thought so little of his chances of reaching the final round that he had passage booked to sail for Europe today.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 30.—(AP)—Mrs. O. S. Hill of Kansas City won the trans-Mississippi women's golf championship on the Minikada course today when she defeated Mrs. Miriam Burns Horn of Kansas City, defending champion, 8 and 7.

may keep him out of the hop, step and jump again, an event he would figure to win in a shape.

American high jumpers and pole vaulters appear to enclose all rivale. If Osborn isn't successful in defending his title, it may go to Roy King of Stanford or Rufus Hargard of Texas. Lee Barnes' stiffest opposition in the pole vault will come from his countryman, Ralph Carr, 16 from Nevada, but three also may be Ward Edmonds or Bill Drogmuedler to reckon with.

The weight events will find competition much keener and the Americans hard pressed to hold their own with athletes developed in Sweden, England and Finland as well as Germany. Ernie Sims has won the King of Kings in Kueck, Krenk, Robert and Schwarz who have beaten 50 feet frequently and 51 feet occasionally, but Germany has Karl Hirschfeld, who tossed the 16-pound iron ball to a new world's record distance of 51 feet, 9 1/2 inches this spring. Again, in the javelin, America has the best spear-throwing talent ever developed with a quartet able to do around 215 feet consistently, but Swedish boy Gunnar Lindstrom, the world's javelin champion, and Finland's new ace in Bertilla, who has broken the world's record, besides Jonni Myrta, the veteran who has won the last two Olympic titles.

Houser, the discus champion, and Hartman, the world's record holder, will be hard to beat, if they return to old form. So will Eric Krenk, the new Stanford star, but again Germany puts forward a threat in Hoffmeister, credited with beating Hartman's world mark recently with a throw of 159 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

Hammer-throwing, a neglected art abroad until recently, now has developed potential champions in Skold of Sweden, Erickson of Finland and Nokes of England. To beat any of them it will take some heroic work by the American veterans, McGrath and Merchant, or by some such newcomers as

Wright and Black, college men.

Summing it up, America appears certain of victory in only three of the nine field events on this year's Olympic program, but fairly sure of three others, with at least a good chance to break through in any one of the remaining three. It should be a rough and rugged battle of skill and brawn from the first toss to the last jump.

NEW YORK, June 30.—(AP)—Gifford Cochrane's Man O' War club, Genie, raced his way to victory in the \$29,000 buyers stakes at Aqueduct today. Second to Vito in the Belmont, Genie was given the best of the field today. Vito had been scheduled to start but was scratched.

Genie, carrying 116 pounds, went to the post on 11 to 5 favorite odds and came up to expectations by leading Sun Beau and Ironsides to the finish.

ROCKAWAY PARK, N. Y., June 30.—(AP)—Two world records set in one race before the attack of the candidates for the American Women's Olympic swimming team on the first day of a four-day program of Olympic tryouts and national championship events at the Rockaway playland pool today.

In retaining her title at 40 yards, and qualifying for the Olympic team at the slightly shorter 50-meter distance, Miss Martha Norrellius of the Women's Swimming association clipped nearly two seconds from her own record, covering the distance in 5 minutes, 19.3 seconds. Her former record for the 40 yards was 5 minutes, 51.2 seconds. (This time also bettered the 40-meter record of 5:51 flat, also held by Miss Norrellius.)

Wants City Gas Tax
