Yesterday at the official opening of the Crater Lake season, when the state highway department began to operate between the lake and Medford, a daily mail service also began between this city and the lake. FUNERAL HELD FOR CHRIS CHASTAIN

Funeral services for Chris Chastain, former Medford high school boy who was killed in a logging camp near Bend, Oregon, last Friday were held this morning at Grants Pass. The unfortunate youth, 22 years of age and intended entering the University of Oregon this fall, who has been known in this city, where he lived for seven years before moving to Eugene with his parents. In his high school days here, he was a member of the football and basketball teams, and took part in other student activities. He is survived by his father and mother and two brothers.

The Bend Bulletin of Saturday gave the following report of the accident:

Chris Chastain, 22-year-old teamster, died at 6 o'clock last night as the result of a fractured skull suffered in an accident near Crescent city yesterday. Chastain was walking directly back of a team of horses pulling a log when the whitehorse broke and struck him in the face. Both upper and lower jaws were broken and his skull fractured by the force of the blow.

He was brought to St. Charles hospital in Bend where he died a few hours later. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Clayton of Grants Pass. A 60th birthday party was held in Bend last night. The body will be shipped to Grants Pass tonight for burial.

Chastain was working for Fred Anderson when the accident happened. He is said to be a contractor getting out logs in the Crescent country for a Klamath Mills lumber company.

MINNESOTA IS HIT BY TORNADO

At least three persons were killed and a dozen injured and property and crop damage estimated at \$100,000 was caused by a series of storms and small tornadoes which struck in four northwest states last night and early today.

Minnesota, North and South Dakota and Wisconsin were visited by the 600, 600 and rain storm which developed into tornadoes at Anoka, Minn., and Clear Lake, Wis., where they caused damage estimated at \$150,000.

The dead are: Miss Grace Hatfield, 27, Aberdeen, killed when her automobile overturned while she was attempting to beat the storm to Wheatland, N. D.; Mrs. M. Herman, 10-year-old, killed when a barn collapsed.

Lois Kane, 17, Fargo, Dak., struck by lightning.
