## TIGRESS ESCAPES FROM ZOO, FINALLY SHOT BY HUNTER

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 2.—(AP)—A 200-pound untrained Singapore tigress, tipped away the steel bars of her cage in the wild animals building of Henri Cartel's park, early today and roamed for several hours within the building, terrorizing scores of other animals and birds before she was killed.

George Blaise, big game hunter and collector for the New York Zoological society, shot the animal.

Walter Maseet, youthful night caretaker, narrowly escaped the big cat after he discovered her attacking a camel. He took refuge in the office.

Police officers of the city, armed with automatic rifles, were dispatched to the scene, although at no time according to the officer in charge, was there any danger of the beast escaping from the building.

Cartel is a dealer in wild animals. He said the tigress had a way with her and had been let out by her alone. He killed her at 3 p. m. She ate three chickens before being killed.

## SEARCH FOR AIR MAIL PILOT IN NORTH AFRICA

CASA BLANCA, Morocco, July 2.—(AP)—French aviators were searching the fog-covered desert coast south of Cape July today for Pilot Reine, who has been lost since Saturday when he left Casablanca for Paris.

The region in which the search is being conducted is the same where Reine was once forested down and held for ransom for 10 days by hostile tribesmen.

New Era States Postage.  
S. A. E. M. Over, July 2.—(AP)—Miss Cornelia Martin, state librarian, estimates that under the new postage law recently enacted by congress, the Oregon library will save about \$2500 a year.

Since the rate will apply to books returned to the library, as well as those mailed by patrons, the patrons will find the benefit as well as the state. Last year the state library mailed to patrons 23,621 packages of books.

## Nationally Known Authorities Will Judge Recipes Contest



WASHINGTON, D. C., June 19.—Three nationally known authorities on home economics and food chemistry will serve as judges in the 1500 Cash Prizes Recipes Contest being conducted by the American Bottlers of Carbonated Beverages in connection with the industry's national advertising campaign in leading newspapers of the country.

The judges, as announced today by National Secretary Junior Owens of the bottlers' association, are: Dr. Minna C. Denton, head of the Home Economics Department, George Washington University, Washington, D. C.; Dr. Lillian B. Storms, director, Home Economics Department, American Bottlers of Carbonated Beverages, and Prof. J. H. Buchanan, professor of food chemistry, Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa.

Advertisements appearing in this and more than 300 newspapers carry announcements of the contest, which is nation wide in scope and is open to anyone, anywhere, except anyone connected with the bottled carbonated beverage industry. It will close at midnight, August 31, 1928, and the names of the winners will be announced December 1 in the newspapers in which the industry's national advertising is appearing.

The purpose of the contest is to obtain from housewives, chefs, home economics teachers and their pupils, and others, as many new ideas as possible for the use of these "soft drinks" in the home, in hotels, restaurants, school lunches, hospitals and elsewhere.

Ninety-six cash prizes will be distributed as follows:  
First prize, \$100.00; second prize, \$75.00; third prize, \$50.00; fourth prize, \$25.00; fifth prize, \$10.00; prizes six to ten inclusive, each \$5.00, prices eleven to ninety-six inclusive, each \$2.50.

Entries must be submitted to American Bottlers of Carbonated Beverages, 726-729 Bond Building, Washington, D. C. Anyone may submit as many recipes in which bottled carbonated beverages are used as they desire. It is unnecessary, but no recipe postmarked after midnight, August 31, 1928, when the contest closes, will be considered for a prize.

Recipes selected as probable prize winners will be tested at the George Washington University Home Economics Department, so that, under the rules for the contest, the judges may be assured that the recipes chosen are "desirable and practical for general use."

Widepread interest in the contest is reported by the bottlers' national headquarters. Hundreds of recipes already have been received from every section of the United States, including many from this vicinity.

## AVIATOR INJURED IN PLANE CRASH YESTERDAY DIES

NEWPORT, R. I., July 2.—(AP)—Two lieutenant commanders are dead as a result of a plane by a naval aviator into the harbor here from a height of 1,000 feet.

Lieutenant Commander Thurlbert Nelson Alford of the U. S. S. Wright, the pilot who was strapped to his seat, died almost instantly when the craft struck the water yesterday.

Lieutenant Commander William Duffell, of the Gould Island air station, rescued from the harbor by naval craft, died at the Government Hospital.

The plane had executed three loops and was about to start a fourth when it went into a tail spin from which Alford was unable to right it.

The plane, a Curtiss pursuit machine, belonged to the U. S. S. Concord, which is a member of the routing fleet. It was recovered from the water by the tug Babcock.

Alford was 41 years old and a native of Texas. He was graduated from the naval academy in 1905. Duffell was 32 and had been here here.

## ANITA STEWART IS GRANTED A DIVORCE

LOS ANGELES, July 2.—(AP)—Anita Stewart Olin, wife known in private life as Anna Mae Brennan, was granted an interlocutory decree of divorce here today from Rudolph Cameron Brennan.

Miss Stewart told the court that her husband lived night life in New York and that she didn't like it. She went to the "Lambie" club, where he lived alone and refused to return. He wanted to go out and stay out," she said "and finally he packed his belongings and left me."

Miss Stewart filed her suit here under the name of Brennan instead of Cameron, by which the couple were also known.

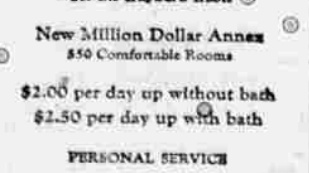

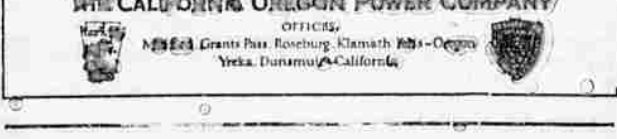

## WEALTHY CLUB MAN, PORTLAND, LEAPS TO DEATH

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2.—(AP)—Frank W. Burke, 55, wealthy club man, leaped to his death early today from the Broadway bridge. The harbor patrol recovered the body at 1 a. m.

An extensive new relay was abandoned at the center of the bridge. The relay tender heard a splash and found the car and Burke's car when he reached the relay spot.

Papers found on the body were addressed to the Arlington club, by Burke, resident of an exclusive apartment house here.

There was no note on the body, police determined.

Burke is said to have been wealthy and to have had extensive land holdings in central Oregon. He spent much of his time traveling.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Burke, brother and sister-in-law of the dead man, who came north from California two weeks ago to visit Burke, could offer no motive for his act.

Friends of the man indicated, however, that Burke had been in ill health for several years.

## JOHN M. PARKER WILL SUPPORT ALFRED SMITH

NEW ORLEANS, July 2.—(AP)—John M. Parker, former governor of Louisiana and vice presidential candidate with Theodore Roosevelt in the Bull Moose ticket in 1912, announced today he would support Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York for the presidency in November.

Mr. Parker said he would support the New Yorker because he has closer touch with the wants of humanity and the welfare of the people than any executive in any reelection.

12 Killed in Toronto  
KIASNOVALSK, Slovakia, July 2.—(AP)—Twelve persons have been killed by a torpedo which struck this town, causing heavy damage.
