WHY MANY DEMOCRATIC WOMEN ARE FOR HOOVER

THE most significant political event in this state since the nomination of Hoover and Smith is the repudiation of the latter and support of the former, by Mrs. Alexander Thompson, former National Democratic committee woman from Oregon and former member of the State Legislature.

Unlike former Governors Pierce and West, Mrs. Thompson places principle above party, not only refusing to follow her party in the support of Al Smith, but declaring she is proud to work for, and vote for, the Republican candidate, Herbert Hoover.

Mrs. Thompson has a large and enthusiastic following among the women of the state, and her action lends weight to the contention that the women of this country are going to defeat the Democratic candidate, with a majority so overwhelming that no Republican defection on the wet-dry issue can overcome it.

Mrs. Thompson's statement in the Oregonian so well represents the real sentiment of Democratic leaders like West and Pierce, so accurately reflects the convictions of the McAdoo faction in the Democratic party that it is printed in full as follows:

To the Editor: Along with my good friend, James H. Hallett, I wish to be recognized as another Democrat who will support Herbert Hoover for the presidency.

I consider that the nomination of Al Smith is the error of this year. The Democrats ever made, and that his election would be nothing short of a calamity.

It is a product of Tammany Hall, nurtured from its youth in its doctrines, trained and shaped by its nefarious policies and obedient to its mandates. And Tammany Hall is the oldest, most efficiently organized and most corrupt political group in America today.

Tammany has always been a stumbling block to the progress of the Democratic party, for by its alliance with the corrupt bosses in Indiana and Illinois it has managed to underhand practices that have been a disgrace to the country. IS IODIN A SAFE FOOD? Some time ago, writes an correspondent, you asserted that there is not enough iodine in iodized salts to harm anyone.

That is true—I have made that assertion repeatedly, and I still think it is true. I am a correspondent out of town.

After being treated for three years with St. Vitus' dance in the eye, I cannot refrain from showing you that you are mistaken in the time you published that article. I could not go out in the street. I had spent over \$200 on nerve specialists.

After consulting all these specialists I put my own fertile brain to work and discovered there was something I was taking into my system that was causing my trouble. I had been taking iodized salt extensively for over three years. I stopped it immediately. Gradually grew better, and in eight months I can read and write almost as well as ever and do about.

So you surely will have to concede that iodine can be a source of great trouble. Through all this suffering, which we cannot expect to believe, I believe in moderation in all things, but in moderation is all right for you, but in such a quantity as to do harm.

My dear friend, you have seen it published—all but the symptoms, which we cannot expect to believe. Nevertheless, you have seen that I am not in with the iodine salt combine. It is the effort to persuade people to use iodized salt in place of ordinary table salt. I am "in" with the combine, cordially.

But I no further advocate, for many adults, especially adults who are in a bit of a hurry, more than they can possibly get in iodized salt.
