

PRIZE WINNERS IN LITHIA CITY PARADE NAMED

ASHLAND, July 6.—(Special)—The Fourth of July celebration put on by the Lithians has been pronounced a splendid success in every particular. The weather was ideal, clear and cool. The Lithians have been generously complimented on the way in which their program worked out from the sunrise gun fired at six o'clock a. m. until the early morning hours of the following day.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 6.—(Special)—Jack Gleason was arrested late last night and charged with murder following the fatal shooting in his apartment of Neve Baranov.

Gleason, according to the police confessed the killing, saying "I had been following her around for a long time."
