PORTLAND, Ore., July 7.—(AP) Mrs. Fred Zanello, 23, who last night was rescued from the Willamette river by three youths after she had leaped from the Hawthorne bridge here, died at her home today. Death was due to shock, the coroner's office said. Mrs. Zanello was the wife of a prominent Portland contractor. When rescued from the river last night her first words were "Tell daddy I didn't mean to—oh, tell daddy I didn't mean to." She was hysterical, physicians said, and dependent and in a nervous condition caused by illness in her family.

DOUBT BODY THAT OF JACK MUNROE

NEW YORK, July 7.—(AP) Doubt that the body of a man found in a cabin at Bayou, Ont., was that of Jack Munroe, prospector and former heavyweight pugilist, was expressed from several sources today. Mrs. Jack Munroe, wife of the man who stood up for four rounds before Jim Jeffries when the latter was world's heavyweight champion, said at Toronto, that her husband had no interests at Bayou and that he was looking over mining claims at Red Lake, Ont. But she admitted she had received no word from him in the last couple of days. Canadian dispatches said Munroe's body was found by prospectors attracted to the cabin by the barking of a dog. The dispatches said the dead man apparently had been alone on his last expedition, but relatives here assert he never undertook such trips unaccompanied.

HOOVER HANDS IN HIS RESIGNATION

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 7.—(AP) The resignation of Secretary of Commerce Hoover from the cabinet, effective at President Coolidge's pleasure, was received at the summer White House today. In a telegram dispatched to the commerce secretary today, President Coolidge invited him to stop off at his guest at Cedar Lodge on his way to Palo Alto. Hoover's resignation arrived in the mail this morning under separate cover and as yet has not been accepted by Mr. Coolidge. It is expected the president will follow the same procedure in the case of Hoover and Secretary Work, as followed in previous cases, namely accepting the resignations only when he will have decided on their successors.

OPERATE ON MAYOR WALKER'S SECRETARY

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 7.—(AP) A favorable report was issued today by physicians of the Hollywood hospital on the condition of Charles F. Kerrigan, assistant to Mayor James Walker of New York city, who underwent an operation yesterday for acute appendicitis. Kerrigan's condition was reported as "favorable." "He is doing as well as can be expected," the physicians said.

Governor Smith Attends Funeral of Raskob's Son

CENTREVILLE, Va., July 7.—(AP) Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York arrived in Centerville this morning to attend the funeral of William F. Raskob, son of John J. Raskob, chairman of the finance committee of General Motors corporation. Arriving on a special train at 4 o'clock, the democratic presidential nominee went direct to the Raskob home at Pioneer Point on the Chesapeake river. The funeral services of the young man, who was killed in an automobile accident, followed later in the morning at the Catholic church here.

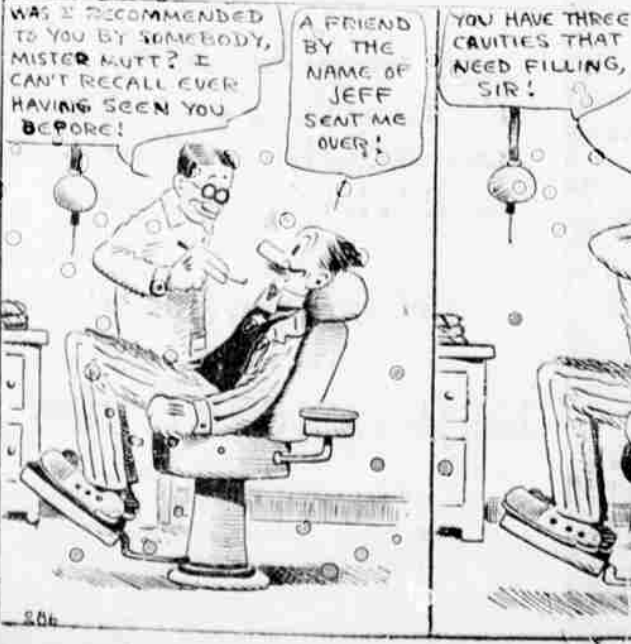
