RUSH WORK UPON AERIAL CIRCUS NEW STRUCTURES FOR COUNTY FAIR

Construction work on five new buildings at the Jackson county fairgrounds is progressing rapidly with indications that everything will be ready for the big fair over to be staged in this part of the state, September 12, 13, 14, and 15.

Members of the fair board met on the grounds the end of last week to inspect the structures and discuss the location of what is to be the largest and most valuable house in the group, an education building which will hold displays of boys' and girls' club work. This feature of the county activity is to be stressed more than in previous years. Cream parlors will be used on all buildings.

In the past many stockmen have refused to exhibit their griddle because of the poor facilities, a canvas covered yard being used. This year it is expected that an unusual show of cattle will be housed in the new permanent pavilion which is to be 24 by 120 feet. The temporary building and show shed is being completed.

Country will have an exclusive show house this fall instead of sharing it with rabbits, an idea has been considered. Another feature of the new development on the grounds will be the automobile pavilion which will be of ample proportions to exhibit all cars and machinery entered. This structure is to be large enough to accommodate airplane displays, which will probably be shown in a few years.

According to figures received from radio owners it is expected that fully 500 entries will be exhibited in the new house which is to be 200 feet long, 20 feet of the space being reserved for the collections.

Work is being rushed in order to finish the big rest room in time for the American Legion convention, August 2, 3 and 4. Bench seats will be provided on the grounds so that visitors may be comfortable most of the time.

Following the meeting Friday evening the board officials dined at the Hotel Medford where program and entertainment features were planned.

Due to the fact that they did not know definitely that there was to be a fair in Medford earlier in the year it was impossible to get in on the regular Pacific coast harness racing circuit. There will, therefore, be no harness races but stumping races, professional and amateur, are scheduled. Boys and girls of school ages living in Jackson and Josephine counties will participate in several races. Those who intend to enter horses should write to the Jackson county fair board, H. C. Frohlich is secretary of the group.

At least one carnival company will be on the scene to furnish the usual county fair atmosphere.
