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CLAIM WOMEN IN MID-WEST ARE ALL FOR HOOVER

EVANSTON, Ill., July 10.—(AP) A statement issued from national headquarters of the Women's Christian Temperance union today said that Herbert Hoover could lose most of the cast and still be elected president next November.

The republican nominee might be defeated in New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New Jersey and still win a majority of the nation's electoral votes, the statement said.

"Two or three wet neighborhoods in a state do not give the state to Tammany," the W. C. T. U. officers asserted, asserting figures to show that 67 per cent of voters in New Jersey and still win a majority in fifteen states.

The temperance union also declared that women of the mid-west are organizing "almost entirely on an anti-Tammany basis."

"The tremendous strength of organized women has turned Hoover almost exclusively because of his pronounced views favoring prohibition, his personal attitude against liquor and the probability of an efficient enforcement of the law under a Hoover administration," the statement said.

CORN PRODUCTION LESS, WHEAT CROP GREATER THAN '27

WASHINGTON, July 10.—(AP)—First indications of the size of this year's crop was given today by the department of agriculture which, basing its calculations on conditions prevailing July 1, placed production at 2,752,637,000 bushels, compared with 2,786,288,000 bushels last year.

Indicated production of other crops, also based on their condition July 1, was announced as follows: Winter wheat, 542,782,000 bushels, compared with 512,600,000 bushels a month ago and 552,810,000 bushels last year.

Durum wheat, 72,521,000 bushels, compared with 76,000,000 bushels last year.

Other spring wheat, 182,628,000 bushels, compared with 242,900,000 bushels.

The average of the important crops this year, that remaining to be harvested in the case of winter wheat and rice, and their condition on July 1, follow:

Corn, 102,230,000 acres and 73.1 per cent of normal.

Winter wheat, 6,147,000 and 76.9.

Durum wheat, 6,147,000 and 76.2.

Other spring wheat, 15,478,000 and 71.7.

All wheat, 57,750,000 and 74.2.

Oats, 11,974,000 and 79.3.

Barley, 12,242,000 and 81.3.

Rye, 2,525,000 and 65.7.

Flax seed, 2,821,000 and 76.8.

White potatoes, 2,342,000 and 84.8.

Sweet potatoes, 856,000 and 77.0.

Beans, dry edible, 1,725,000 and 75.2.

Hay, all time, 58,631,000 and 76.7.

Wild hay, condition, 71.3.

Pasture, condition, 84.4.

Stocks of wheat remaining on farms July 1 are estimated at 2,689 per cent of the 1927 crop, or about 23,450,000 bushels, compared with 27,245,000 bushels a year ago and 28,841,000 the five-year average on July 1.
