Martin Jensen, the famous aviator who flew the Aloha from Oakland to Honolulu in 28 hours and six minutes, winning second prize in the Dole trans-Pacific air race, will address the weekly meeting of the Copco forum tomorrow noon.

Mr. Jensen has had many interesting experiences in the air and his talk is bound to prove educational to all who attend.

By special arrangement, tomorrow's forum meeting will be thrown open to the public in order that everyone may hear Pilot Jensen and his talk on "Aeronautics."

KLAMATH W.U. BOY DROWNED IN RIVER

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 11.—(Special Cable) Francis, aged 16, Western Union messenger boy, was drowned last evening when swept away from the shore by the swift eddies and currents of Link river. His cousin, Lawrence Meyers, unaided attempted to save young Francis and was forced to release his hold when Francis clutched him desperately around the neck.

The body was discovered 10 minutes after the tragedy, but all efforts at resuscitation proved unavailing.
