EAGLE POINT MAN IDENTIFY CLUE BUYS APARTMENT TO VICTIM AUTO HOUSE, CORVALLIS ACCIDENT FOUND

The newest and largest apartment home in Corvallis, Ore., known as the Wilder and located near the Oregon Agricultural college campus, has been sold to J. M. Willey of Eagle Point by R. C. Corn, realtor, in a consideration of \$75,000. The deal was closed yesterday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Willey expect to move to Corvallis the end of the week to take charge of the new business. The building consists of 15 modern apartments, all furnished and electrically equipped. They had been in the apartment business for 20 years in California and Utah before coming to southern Oregon.

The first clue to the identity of the 18-year-old youth known only as "Young," whose life was crushed out on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway July 1, last, by the wheels of a truck driven to East Salsler of Klamath Falls was found today.

The Klamath Falls Evening Herald reports that it had received a letter from George W. Young, R. F. 1, Box 27, Box 255, Santa Cruz, Calif., making inquiries. The letter says in part:

"I have a son somewhere in that vicinity who works at the mills, and shifts from mill to mill. I feel much concerned as I do not know where my son is at the present time."

The body has been held at the

Ashland morgue since death, awaiting location of relatives. The young man refused to give the address of his parents to the authorities. Two San Francisco addresses were found around his belongings.

The dead youth was about 18 years of age, medium built, light complexion and of medium height, and appeared sickly. Jackson county authorities will give a detailed description of the youth to the Santa Cruz paper today.

DETAILS OF MRS. FISK'S DROWNING REACH MEDFORD

The Sacramento Bee of yesterday contains the following article which the tragedy that cost the lives of Mrs. Hazel Fisk and her son Jack, age nine, Monday. Mrs. Fisk is a sister of L. B. Walthers of the California-Oregon Power company purchasing department.

A double funeral service to-morrow morning at the Miller & Shelton chapel will pay tribute to the memory of Mrs. Hazel E. Fisk (Hazel E. Walthers), 36, who lost her life in the Trinity river near Weaver'sville in a vain effort to save the life of her nine-year-old son, Jack E. Fisk. The service for the son will be at 10:30 a. m. and the service for the mother at the East Lawn cemetery.

The bodies of Mrs. Fisk and her son arrived here today from Redding. Their deaths occurred Monday while the Fisk family, who make their home at 2414 Twenty-seventh street, were on a vacation excursion in Trinity county. The lad while wading in the Trinity river got beyond his depth and Mrs. Fisk was drowned also in an attempted rescue.

Mrs. Fisk belonged to one of the earliest California families here, great-grandfather being the late George Dunner, for whom the ill-fated Dunner party was named. Her grandmother was the late Mrs. Elitha C. Wilber, one of the survivors of the Dunner party.

Mrs. Fisk leaves her husband, Les E. Fisk, and a daughter, Marjorie. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Walthers, and four brothers, Elmer Jr., Irwin E., Winfield W. and Myrtle W. Walthers, live in Sacramento.

Both bodies were recovered from the river yesterday by a searching party.

SUSPICION SAVES SERVICE STATION A LOSS OF \$167 LOOT

W. S. Henry, manager of the Army Service Station followed a hunch last night and saved approximately \$167 by going back to the station and removing the money a short time before the establishment was entered by a burglar, who for his loot took two 28&4.49 tires.

Henry had seen a stranger loiter near the station for most of the evening and afternoon and after the station had been closed a short time after 10 o'clock by V. Groves, station attendant, Henry hurried back and removed the money from the cash drawer of the safe.

After Henry had removed the money the station was entered thru a back door, one lock of which was picked and the other jammed. The cash drawer was pried open, but it was empty. The burglar left no clues.
