

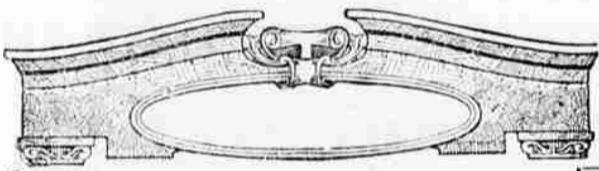

FIVE DROWNED IN NORTHWEST PAST TWO DAYS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—(AP)—Five lives have been lost this week in water accidents in the Northwest.

Helen Fitzpatrick, 12, of Albany, drowned in the Willamette river yesterday when she slipped into deep water while wading. Her sister, 14, barely escaped death in an attempted rescue.

Mrs. Hazel Pisk and a son, 12 years old, were drowned in the Trinity river near Weaverville, Cal. The woman died in a futile attempt to save her son. She was a sister of J. B. Withler of the California Oregon Power company, Medford.

H. G. Caser, Astoria salmon fisherman, drowned in the Grays Harbor jetty Monday night when a trolling boat overturned. Word of the accident was brought to Aberdeen yesterday by J. A. Maki, survivor of the accident.

Warren T. Kelly, 22, of Corvallis, drowned last night in the East Green lake near Seattle.

The Columbia river near Tahuya view was being dragged today in an attempt to recover the body of Roy Winchel, 19, who disappeared Monday. It was feared the lad had drowned.

SAM KOZER GETS STATE BUDGET JOB, HOSS SEC'Y STATE

SALEM, Ore., July 11.—(AP)—Sam A. Kozar, once appointed and twice elected secretary of state, will resign September 1 and will be appointed state budget director. This was announced late yesterday by Governor Patterson.

Hal E. Hoss of Oregon City will be appointed to succeed Kozar as secretary of state. This was not announced by the governor but is a certainty since Hoss is the republican nominee for the office, as was Kozar when he was appointed by Governor Olcott in 1920.

The office of state budget director was created by the 1927 legislature. Under the act the salary of the director is neither fixed nor limited, but is left in the discretion of the governor.

At the end of this year Mr. Kozar will have been 30 years in state offices. Beginning in 1920 he served for eight years as auditing clerk under Secretary of State P. I. Dunbar. There followed a period as chief clerk under Secretary of State Frank Benson and then as state insurance commissioner by appointment of Benson after the latter became governor. Next Kozar became deputy secretary of state under Ben W. Olcott and some months after Olcott became governor at the death of Governor Withycombe he appointed Kozar secretary of state.

PRESIDENT IS STILL SILENT REGARDING HOOVER SUCCESSOR

SUPERIOR, Wis., July 12.—(AP)—President Coolidge will accept the resignation from the cabinet of Secretary Hoover of the commerce department, but the date of acceptance has not been decided.

President Coolidge will not ask the republican presidential candidate to remain in the cabinet during the whole electoral campaign. The resignation of Secretary Work of the interior department also will be accepted.

Mr. Coolidge has names before him to fill both vacancies in the cabinet. As yet he has made no choice.

St. Louis Bank Robbed
ST. LOUIS, July 12.—(AP)—The West End bank, a block and a half from the police station in University City, a suburb, was robbed of \$22,000 by five armed men this afternoon. The robbers escaped after an exchange of shots with police in which apparently no one was hit.

Cousin Boy Hurt
MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 12.—(AP)—Floyd Shorbondy, 29, may die from injuries he received at the Cousin Bay jetty yesterday when he fell from a rock train which ran over and crushed both his legs. Shorbondy was a brakeman on the jetty train. He lived in North Bend.

Succeeds Father



Chang Hsieuh-liang, 26-year-old son of Marshal Chang Tso-lin, Manchurian war lord and commander of the Northern Chinese forces, reported dead after a railroad bombing, is to succeed his father in control of what remains of the Northern Chinese government, according to reports from the Chinese war zone. He has been in command of the retreating Northern forces, fleeing Peking on the advances of Southern Nationalists.

MAY DISQUALIFY AL'S OPPONENT AS A DEMOCRAT

ATLANTA, Ga., July 12.—(AP)—The announced intention of former Congressman W. D. Upshaw to work for the defeat of Governor Al Smith today had been made the basis of an effort to declare the dry crusader ineligible as a democratic candidate for congress from the fifth district.

In a formal statement last night, William Schley Howard, chairman of the fifth district democratic executive committee, said he would call a meeting of the committee at the earliest possible moment to consider the question.

"I will insist that the committee declare Mr. Upshaw ineligible as a democrat under the rules of the state committee," Mr. Howard declared.

Mr. Upshaw recently was qualified to oppose Congressman Leslie J. Steele. His name has been entered in the democratic primary September 12.

Prefers Frying Fish for President to Keeping His Wife

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 12.—(AP)—As between frying fish for President Coolidge and going to court to resist a divorce action, Ernest Gilpin favors frying fish. Gilpin, employed in the Summer White House kitchen at Cedar Island lodge, wrote the Milwaukee circuit court that he would be unable to appear to answer charges of desertion and cruelty filed by his wife. He said to do so might cost him his job.

The court entered the letter as an answer in the case and directed Gilpin to fry enough fish to assure Mrs. Gilpin \$12 weekly separate maintenance allowance.

BROOKHART DENIES HE IS AFTER P. M. S.; WANTS HIGHER-UPS

ATLANTA, Ga., July 12.—(AP)—The purpose of the senate investigation into alleged irregularities in republican postoffice patronage is not to cause the removal of postmasters who have contributed money to secure their appointments, was stated by Senator Smith W. Brookhart of Iowa, chairman, at today's hearing here.

"The impression has gone out that this investigation will cause the removal of several postmasters who have contributed money to secure their appointments or reappointments," said Senator Brookhart.

The committee wants it distinctly understood that such is not the purpose.

"If the hearings prove that tribute is being unlawfully levied upon postmasters, it is the view of the committee that those who collect and enforce this tribute are the ones to blame and it is the purpose of the committee to make an end of this system."

WIFE, SON AND TWO MEN SLAIN; KILLER ESCAPES

HUMPHREYS, Ark., July 12.—(AP)—The slaying of Mrs. Emilee Booher, wife of a prominent Mansfield farmer, her 25-year-old son and two hired men today was a complete mystery to police. Vernon Booher, another son, told the police he discovered the bodies Monday night when he hurried to the house upon hearing shots shortly after he had left to bring in the cows.

In the dining room, he said, he found the body of his mother, shot from behind. Her head was split open from the impact of a rifle bullet. In the kitchen was the body of his brother, Fred, shot through the mouth and back.

Rushing out to the barn to seek assistance from the hired men, he said he found Bill Bosack, one of the hands, dead in the barn, a bullet hole in the back of his head. In the lunkhouse was the body of the other, Gabriel Gornby, shot through the mouth.

The husband and father, Henry Booher, was at a farm two miles away at the time of the shooting, and the two daughters of the slain woman, Dorothy and Alberta, were at Mannville, practicing basketball.

The only clue found was an empty shell from a .303 rifle, which police think was the weapon used by the slayer.

SENATOR WILL TO DODGE SMITH FOR A DRY PLATFORM

SPOKANE, Wash., July 12.—(AP)—Senator C. C. Dill of Washington today announced his candidacy for re-election on the democratic ticket and will stand squarely on the law enforcement plank of the Houston platform regarding the 18th amendment.

"It is well known," he said, "that I am opposed to modifying the Volstead act except to make its enforcement provisions more stringent. What we need most today is honest, effective, impartial enforcement of the prohibition law."

The senator stated his intention of fighting for farm relief, against encroachments of public utilities upon the people's rights and against the arbitrary use of injunctions by the courts in labor disputes.

SEPTIC SORE THROAT EPIDEMIC FATAL TO 16 PEOPLE IN EAST

LEE, Mass., July 12.—(AP)—Two more deaths today in the epidemic of septic sore throat in this town brought the mortality total to 14. Salvador Beach, an 85-year-old civil war veteran, and John Carver, 75, died today.

LA SALLE, Ill., July 12.—(AP)—Septic poisoning of streptococcus infection was held responsible for the deaths of Robert and Boniface Conway, who died within three days of each other. Tests by medical experts determined the cause of death and disclosed that the water and milk supply at the farm home was safe.

Rural Teachers in Oregon Declared to Be Superior

SALEM, Ore., July 12.—(AP)—Rural school teachers in Oregon are better prepared for their work than are the teachers of most other states represented at the recent rural school conferences held in Los Angeles, according to W. M. Smith, assistant state superintendent of schools, who was one of the Oregon representatives at the meeting.

Smith said today that before a teacher can be given a certificate to teach in the rural schools of this state there is a requirement of 36 weeks of training in a normal school in addition to the completion of a four-year high school course. By 1923, Smith said, there would be a minimum standard of graduation from a two-year normal.

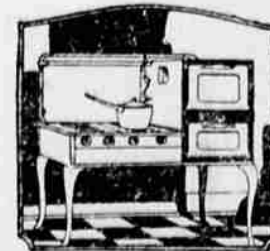
