HEENEY WORKING TO PUT A PUNCH INTO HIS LEFT

FAIRHAVEN, N. J., July 12.—(AP) Most of Tom Heenev's preparations for his shot at the heavy-weight title on July 26 are based on the development of his south-paw punching apparatus.

His right hand, Heenev is pretty well satisfied with. He has used it effectively for years shooting jolting straight punches under the heart. These body punches have been the Anzac's best offensive equipment.

Now he's developing his left hand so that it won't feel slighted when he takes it along with his right into the Yankee stadium ring in two weeks. Heenev has used his left hand to a great extent, of course, in all of his fights in the country but there's been little or no dynamite in it. Present practice in sparring matches here are beginning to show results. The challenger now has a left hook that calls for some respect from the critics as well as his sparring mates.

With thunder rolling and heavy clouds overhead, Heenev went thru his first night workout last night and made such a good showing that the critics were taken somewhat aback.

TUNNEY TAKES A DAY OFF; WILL WORK SUNDAY

SPECULATOR, N. Y., July 13.—(AP) Friday the 13th was a holiday in Speculator where Gene Tunney is training to defend his heavy-weight title against Tom Heenev, the rugged New Zealander, on July 26 at the Yankee stadium.

The day's rest, Tunney's handlers believe, will keep the champion, who now weighs 190 1/2, almost his fighting weight, from reaching the peak of condition too early. The day of idleness, it was explained, would just about five pounds on him, a margin he will find useful during the 12 days which are yet to come before he defends his crown.

Tunney postponed his 10-round session with sparring partners and punching bags until tomorrow. The champion has agreed to take a week's workout on Sunday while Jess Rickard is here to witness the signing of the New York boxing commission contract for the coming battle. The occasion will be Rickard's first visit to this resort which the champion considers one of the country's most beautiful spots.

N. Y. ATHLETIC CLUB TO SEND OWN TEAM TO THE OLYMPICS

NEW YORK, July 12.—(AP)—The New York Athletic club has decided to send an Olympic team of its own to Europe as a protest against the decisions of the American Olympic selection committee. Five members of the winged foot organization, who failed for various reasons to qualify for the team will be sent abroad at the expense of the club in an effort to have them included in the team.

The five men are Roland Lache, former University of Nebraska sprint star; Weems Bashin, crack hurdler from Alabama Poly; Matt McGrath, veteran hammer thrower; Phil Elkins, Indian decathlon star, who was injured during the events at Philadelphia and was unable to compete in the events, and Norton Jackson, a wrestler.

The fight for places on the team will be under the supervision of Matthew Halpin, chairman of the winged foot athletic committee. All of the five N. Y. A. C. athletes who will attempt to gain places on the team are well-known reformers who failed to make the grade in the tryouts. According to Halpin, the committee's selections were unjust because these men are better than the ones chosen.

KELLOGG'S PEACE NOTE APPROVED BY TWO POWERS

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—Secretary Kellogg's revised treaty for outlawing war is entirely acceptable to Germany and a favorable reply from France is expected within a few days.

A note signed by Acting Foreign Minister Schubert at Berlin, detailing his country's attitude, was made public at the state department last night, while Ambassador Clavel called upon Mr. Kellogg to tell him of the forthcoming French reply.

This will probably be handed to Ambassador Herrick at Paris tomorrow, he said, on the great French holiday celebration of the fall of the Bastille. The reply he described as an acceptance of the explanations and interpretations of the proposed pact as outlined by Mr. Kellogg in his note of June 23.

Germany's acceptance was sweeping and unqualified, and the note declared that the Berlin government was ready to sign the treaty at once in the form in which it was submitted.

A draft of the proposed pact was sent simultaneously to 14 nations, including, in addition to France and Germany, Great Britain, Japan and Italy. Germany was the first to reply.

Under the proposed treaty, the signatory nations would "condemn recourse to war" and "renounce it as an instrument of national policy." Further, they would agree to use only specific means in seeking a settlement of whatever disputes or conflicts might arise between them, regardless of their nature or origin.

KIDNAPED BOY IS FOUND IN HOUSE
