

### TWO KILLED IN CALIF. TOURIST RUNNING FIGHT PARTY IS HIT BY S. P. TRAIN

Robbery at Willow Creek Results in Fatal Battle—Eureka Deputy Killed and Robber Is Slain—Possé Continues Hot Pursuit.

EUREKA, Cal., July 12.—(AP)—Four men in an automobile swooped down on the village of Willow Creek today, robbed the Brizard store there and took its safe with them and hurried away.

Four sheriff's deputies from Burnt Ranch gave chase. The officers and bandits met at Salzer Creek and opened fire. Charles Carpenter, 46, a deputy, was shot and killed. He leaves a widow and five small children.

One bandit was shot and killed. Companions threw him out of their car and sped on. Another bandit jumped from the car and escaped in the woods.

Possé were hastily organized in Humboldt, Trinity and Shasta counties and led by peace officers were scouring the northwestern section of the state in search of the robbers.

MOUNT HOLLY, N. J., July 12.—(AP)—An unidentified aviator was found dead this afternoon beside his fallen plane in the woods between Abilene and Charlestown, about 25 miles from Mount Holly.

### CALIF. TOURIST PARTY IS HIT BY S. P. TRAIN

San Francisco Banker Is Killed and Boy Is Fatally Injured When Car Is Hit by Train Near Dallas, Ore.

DALLAS, Ore., July 12.—(AP)—Oscar T. Smith, 49, of San Francisco, was killed, and a 11-year-old child of William G. Penneycook, San Francisco, was perhaps fatally injured near here today when their automobile, driven by the boy's father, crashed into a Southern Pacific electric train. The accident occurred at a grade crossing about four miles north of Rickwood, near Holmes Gap.

The dead man was an employee of the American bank of San Francisco and wore a special officer's badge.

Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Penneycook were both injured and shaken but their injuries were not serious. William G. Penneycook, driver of the car, is a city electrical staff inspector for the city of San Francisco.

### CHURCH DEACONS ARE SENTENCED TO PENAL FARM

Two deacons of the Hammond Christian church were sentenced to 180 days each on the Indiana penal farm and eight others were found guilty of criminal conduct for trial on a conspiracy charge as a result of the beating administered recently to Fred White, an elder of the church.

The attack was an incident of a two-year war between factions seeking to control the church administration. Neutral members of the congregation, seeking to restore peace, have applied for an injunction against the contending factions.

Stephen J. Craig and Charles Tharr were the two deacons sentenced in city court today for their part in the assault. They were charged with assault and battery. Pending an appeal, their bond was set at \$2000 each.

### General Is Killed

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 12.—(AP)—General Karl Gozary, chief of artillery was killed and several general staff officers were wounded during artillery maneuvers at Halmaszok when a gun exploded. Those wounded included Lieutenant Fred Marshal Fergencsik and Colonel Owey Maxalaseky.

### PROHIBITION REFUSE TO NOMINATE SECY. HOOVER

G. O. P. Nominee Lacks Ten Votes of Beating W. F. Varney for Head of Rabid Dry Ticket—Riot Is Narrowly Averted

CHICAGO, July 12.—(AP)—An independence league will head the national ticket of the prohibition party this year. William F. Varney, Rockville Center, N. Y., was nominated for the presidency on the second ballot at the party convention last night following a persistent attempt by a sizeable minority to nominate ex-endorsee Herbert Hoover.

James A. Edgerton, Alexandria, Va., an independence league official and a former populist, who last week headed the Jefferson-Lincoln league move here to write the prohibition and farmer-labor parties, received the vice-presidential nomination on the first ballot.

Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York was placed in nomination by delegates who opposed the Hoover support, which continued until the final balloting, when Varney received 66 votes to Hoover's 45. On the first roll call Varney had 62 and Hoover 42.

Heavily scenes preceded the actual voting, including several manifestations of discussion within the prohibition ranks following the call for Hoover and Smith. In the demonstration over the sentiment toward Hoover, who was characterized as one who had expressed no clear-cut opinion on the prohibition question, two delegates created excitement by nominating Smith, an avowed opponent of prohibition modification. Both voted for him on the first ballot.

Delegate John B. Hammond, former chief of police of Des Moines, Iowa, gave vent to his anti-Hoover wrath by throwing his badge on the table, declaring that the party had been betrayed and walked out. He charged that the officers of the convention had "sold out" to Hoover.

A resolution was adopted by the party calling for the re-enactment of the law forbidding the manufacture of liquor in the home. Six main planks were included in the prohibition platform as finally adopted. The stand of both major political parties on prohibition was commented, but the "custom of political parties in charging all sins and shortcomings to each other" was denounced.

In addition to the prohibition plank, the platform favored farm relief and called on the voters to ignore prohibition candidates to breaking down the separation of church and state.

The government's steps toward insuring a lasting peace were commended. In the national resources plank, the "power trust" was criticized.

been reached a heavy fog came up and immediate progress of the Kraasin was made impossible, but as the fog lifted it was able to continue its battle with the ice floes.

The first intention of the ship is to proceed to Eryn Island, where several persons were sighted who as yet have not been identified. These men signalled to the Kraasin and the ice-breaker started back, but the vessel stuck them up on returning from the Veltter region. Prof. Sandlovitch expressed the belief that the men were Alpine chamois who were sent in search of Nobile's men six weeks ago. These men were the Italian Alpine chamois Captain Sora and the Norwegian guides Varming and Vandogen.

No word had been heard from this little group, which started about for Eryn Island many weeks ago and were virtually given up for dead many days ago.

### Go After Plane Pilot

After this group is picked up the Kraasin will continue back to the group of the Russian flier, Chukhnovsky, who with four members of his crew is stranded along Northland. Chukhnovsky on Tuesday first sighted the Italia's walking party, whose leader, Dr. Finn Malmgren, Swedish meteorologist, had fled and notified the Kraasin of their position.

Chukhnovsky, on his return flight to the Kraasin, became lost in the fog and made a forced landing near Cape Platen. His landing gear was broken, but he and his men immediately set up a camp and by wireless urged the Kraasin to rescue the two members of the Malmgren group who were in a starving condition.

After Chukhnovsky is picked up the Kraasin will proceed to Virgo Bay, where the pilot will establish a base for further flights in order to seek trace of Roud Amundson and the six men who were carried off in the fog of the Italia when the gondola was torn loose. These men have virtually been given up for lost, but in view of the almost incalculable rescue of Malmgren and Zeeberg, every effort will be made to find them.

Further details of the rescue of Malmgren and Zeeberg were received in Moscow today. These men were wrapped in blankets by the rescuing party and carried aboard the Kraasin.
