

# HOOVER PREPARES A CAMPAIGN PLAN FOR WEST COAST

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP)—Although the situation in the east is presently their first consideration, the directors of Herbert Hoover's campaign for the presidency are finding time to prepare for "left-hand" drives in the middle west and on the Pacific coast.

Members of the national committee from states lying between the Alleghenies and the Rockies have been asked to attend the Chicago meeting. Chairman Work, who at that time will be on his way to California to be present at Mr. Hoover's political rally, will preside. Under present plans two days will be devoted to a discussion of the mid-western situation.

From Palo Alto, where the notification ceremony is to take place on August 11, Mr. Work will go to San Francisco to meet the representatives of the Pacific coast in announcing the two conferences Mr. Hoover's headquarters said simply that they would be held for the purpose of planning the campaign for the states of those sections.

Mr. Hoover has been informed that "75 per cent of the so-called Gannett vote" will support him at

the polls in November. A statement was given out late yesterday at the office of Chairman Work declaring that representatives of German-American societies had called and given assurance that they would rally behind the campaign secretary. The visitors were described as a delegation from a general conference of German-American publishers and societies held recently in New York.

Arrangements are now practically complete for Mr. Hoover's western trip, which is to begin tomorrow night, and in the interim he is clearing up his affairs at the commerce department, so that his desk may be turned over to his successor.

# BOY SCOUT PLAN TO STOP WOMEN SMOKING BARRED BY LEADERS

NEW YORK, July 12.—(AP)—Use of Boy Scouts in a campaign to halt smoking by women, as proposed by the Cleveland Scout council, has been repudiated by the executive board of the Boy Scouts of America.

The Cleveland council recently adopted a resolution condemning advertisements tending to induce women to smoke cigarettes, and the Scouts were urged to adopt as another "daily good turn" the creation of sentiment against smoking by women.

James E. West, chief Scout executive, in a letter to Floyd A. Howe, president of the Cleveland council, took the latter organization to task for acting in a matter which is not in the province of a local council and which involves "misunderstanding as to the real aims and purposes of the Boy Scout movement."

"To us here," the letter said, "it is most unfortunate and indeed absurd that a suggestion should be made by any representative of the Boy Scout movement that Boy Scouts would approach women smoking in public and ask them to give up the habit."

"It is not within the province of the local or even national council to undertake to pass resolutions or legislate on any of the many problems before the American public. We are obligated by our constitution to avoid participation in controversial and political questions."

# REDISCOUNT RATE RAISED TO 5 PCT.

NEW YORK, July 12.—(AP)—Directors of the Federal Reserve bank of New York today increased its rediscount rate from 4 1/2 to 5 per cent, following similar action

by the Chicago Federal Reserve bank.

The 4 1/2 per cent had been in effect since May 15. This is the first time since 1921 when it was reduced from 5 to 4 1/2 per cent.
