M'MINNVILLE MAN IS BOUND AND ROBBED OF \$400

MEDFORD, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—Three youths were being sought today following the robbery of R. W. Thomas, who was left bound and gagged in his car three miles east of here shortly before midnight last night. Thomas, bound by a Portland motorist, said he lost \$400.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—F. A. Webster, chief of Portland police, in search for three youths in a car, yesterday who robbed R. W. Thomas of \$400. Webster found Thomas beside his car near McMinnville and released his bonds and then drove to Portland.

Webster said Thomas told him he called a large check in Houlton, Me., yesterday, and started to McMinnville. When within three miles of the city, three young men forced him to the side of the road and robbed him. They used coats and a handkerchief to bind and gag him. They left their victim in the car.

Thomas said he worked for more than an hour to release the gag and then opened the car door with his teeth. He tumbled to the ground in an effort to break his bonds. Thomas' only injuries were badly lacerated and swollen wrists, caused by the tightly drawn cords with which he was tied.

LARRY MANN AND NOBILE CERTAIN AIR DERBY FLIER MEN LEFT IN THE ITALY ARE DEAD

Among the interesting sidelights of yesterday's visit of the national air reliability tour at the Medford airport, was a reunion between William Brock of Detroit, who flew last year to England and thence to Japan on an attempted around-the-world flight, and Larry Mann of this city. Ten years ago both men were members of the United States army and were stationed at a field near Memphis, Tenn.

The reunion was spent over an hour together recounting old experiences at Memphis, Tenn., and comparing experiences of the past 10 years. While the two men were conversing, shortly after Brock's arrival, George Halderman joined the conversation and in a few minutes it developed that he, too, had been stationed at the Memphis field as a cadet at the same time that the local air-flier was receiving flying instruction.

Halderman last year flew with Ruth Elder on an attempted trans-Atlantic crossing but was forced down near the Azores islands, to be picked up by a Dutch steamship. When asked how the ocean trip compared with the land tour, Halderman answered: "Well, I feel considerably safer with the land beneath me. It makes a big difference."

In speaking of his ocean flight, Halderman continued: "It is largely a matter of good fortune that I am here today, as the ocean is a place where our trouble with the oil fuel line began is not a regular steamer lane. We can think our lucky stars that the Dutch ship was two days late out of port or otherwise we would have gone the way of others who attempted the dangerous ocean crossing and were unsuccessful. I guess we sat on top of the plane for an hour or so before we were rescued."

"Would you attempt such a flight again?" Halderman was asked.

His face grew into a large smile, as he replied: "Well, you can never tell, but I am making no rash promises that I would attempt an ocean flight or am I saying that I would not?"

"What is Ruth Elder doing now?" was another question asked.

"She's down in Hollywood, the last I heard, making moving pictures for some company down there. No, I am not interested in pictures. Aviation is my life. I started flying in 1917 and no one could get me to desert my profession, if you can call it that."

GILLETT DENIES HE SPOKE SLIGHTLY OF MRS. AL SMITH

NEW YORK, July 17.—(AP)—The New York Times today publishes a letter from Frederick H. Gillett, senator from Massachusetts, denying he instituted a public comparison between Mrs. Herbert Hoover and Mrs. Alfred B. Smith.

"The only foundation for the charge," he said, "is this: 'I was talking to a small group of women and told them that as they were, countless interested in the lady who was likely to be mistress of the White House, I would tell them about Mrs. Hoover, whom I knew very well, but that I could say nothing about Mrs. Smith, for I had never even seen her.'"

"The reference to Mrs. Smith was entirely accidental and casual; there was absolutely nothing of denigration or criticism or comparison uttered or implied or intended."

NEW YORK, July 17.—(AP)—First-hand accounts of the disaster of the Italian Italia have been heard by 422 Americans on a ship Arctic cruise aboard the Hamburg-American liner Reliance.

Survivors of the ill-fated Arctic expedition and rescuers were entertained aboard the Reliance when the ship called at Kings Bay, Spitzbergen Saturday, said a wireless message to the company's offices here from Captain Wilhelm Mueller, who also told of an interview he had with General Nobile.

"General Nobile is all right mentally in spite of suffering from shock and weakness," said Captain Mueller. The Italia's commander was confined to his cabin aboard the base ship since the Italia due to a broken leg and a strained arm.

Nobile told the captain of the suffering he and his men endured in their boat for a month on the ice with food for only 15 days. Nobile, he said, was sure that the 45 men who were carried away in the Italia after the accident had broken down and fallen on the ice, were dead.

Officers of the Italia de Milano, Major Mantelona, who was the first to sight the Nobile party on the ice, Captain Soren, the Alpine chasseur, and the Dutch guide, Van Donsen, were entertained on board the Reliance.

Van Donsen addressed the passengers, telling them of his unsuccessful rescue attempt, and Captain Soren told of his thrilling rescue by plane after being forced to eat some of his dogs.

The passengers were thrilled by their contact with the great Arctic tragedy.

"Nobody here knows anything about Amundson," the captain's message concluded.
