SUSPECT IN EUREKA MURDER CASE IS WELL KNOWN HERE

Peter Stauff, alias Stoss, wanted by California authorities for the murder of a Eureka, Calif., local official, is well known to local authorities, because while awaiting trial for a plot to rob the gold hill bank in 1921, he was one of the most picturesque and desperate prisoners ever confined in the county jail at Jacksonville.

Stauff was a short, powerfully built man, with a mean disposition, and a mania for cleanliness. While a county jail prisoner, he had a daily routine of the jail, and it is believed that was a clean-up. A prisoner had the choice of taking a bath every day or bathing Stauff. He also ruled the cleaning squads with an iron hand. The then sheriff, Charles E. Terrell, appointed him county jail dictator, and Stauff took the appointment seriously.

Stauff first came into the criminal limelight when he was sentenced to Salton for a long term for his part in the robbery of a passenger train at Corbett, Ore., in 1901. After serving many years he was pardoned by Governor Os West, and was befriended by a wealthy Portlander.

Stauff was arrested in this county on information furnished by a former convict, that he and a companion planned to rob the gold hill bank. On the night set for the crime, a case of dynamite was found under the sidewalk near the bank. Stauff and his companion were arrested in this city the following day.

At the trial Stauff denied the charges, and claimed a "frame-up" and he produced letters from state and prison officials, as to his good character. The jury found him guilty, and Judge Calkins sentenced him to seven years.

This was the last Jackson county official record of him, until the Eureka, Calif., murder charge was filed.
