

### COUNTY PASTORS ATTEND OPENING OREGON SYNOD

ALBANY, Ore., July 18.—(Special)—The 26th annual session of the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon opened Wednesday at 2:30 in the auditorium of the new main building of Albany college. The session will continue a week with sessions morning, afternoon and evening of each day, with banquets and speakers of state and national prominence on the program.

The attendance for the opening is the "best ever," with ministers and delegates and in some cases their families, present from all over the state. Among those from southern Oregon present are Rev. and Mrs. E. P. Lawrence and Miss Ruth Lawrence of Medford; Rev. H. T. Mitchell of Astoria; Rev. W. Nelson of Phoenix; E. E. M. Vicker of Jacksonville; Frank V. Haight of Klamath Falls; T. Morgan of Baskin Point; J. F. Webster, secretary of Oregon Synod; J. W. Ansell of Gladwell; E. W. Miller of Roseburg and E. H. Walker, former pastor of the Presbyterian church.

John J. A. Wilkinson of North Bend, who has been moderator of the synod for the past year, and is the first layman to hold this office in Oregon, conducted the opening exercises and gave the opening address, or sermon, and also presented to synod a fine new gown, made of myrtle wood, of formal gowning, only in the morning and in evening sessions. The gown, by resolution presented to him its old gown, and Rev. H. E. Thomas of Pine Valley was elected to the new moderator and Rev. J. Y. Stewart of Albany as temporary clerk.

Telegrams of sympathy were ordered sent to the families of Dr. Warren H. Landon, the recent pastor of the Theological seminary in San Anselmo, Cal., and Rev. George McKinley, "long retired," who has until recently lived at Salem, and both of whom have just died, having scars ago served as pastors in Oregon. It was also announced that Rev. and Mrs. Alexander of Oak Grove, who were driving to this point in an open car with a serious automobile accident near Myrtle Point, she being quite severely injured and the car wrecked.

The opening communion service was conducted by Dr. Wm. S. Holt of Portland, father of Dr. Wm. J. Holt of Medford and by Rev. J. P. Lawrence of Medford and Mr. J. A. White of La Grande. At the evening session special trade lectures will be given in the First Presbyterian Church of Albany, by Dr. J. Hubert Ballou of Occidental college, Los Angeles, the use of Wednesday evening being entitled "Jesus and the Human Mind."

Thursday will be National Mission day; Friday, Albany College day; Saturday, Christian education and student pastor work in Oregon state university and college; Monday the board of presbytery; Tuesday, foreign missions and Wednesday, closing business. On Sunday afternoon the synod will go to Salem and join in the dedication of the new \$1,277,000 Presbyterian church at that city, of which Rev. Norman K. Tully is pastor. Saturday afternoon there will be an excursion to Cascade, with dinner and Dr. Ballard's daily little lecture in the open.

Albany college is rating highly for the entertainment of those in attendance in its new building, meals being served in the dining room of Woodland Hall.

Deep regret is felt in the community just recently of President W. W. Greene from Albany to Mitchell town, where he has accepted the presidency of Parsons college, a larger institution. For five years he has given splendid service to Albany college as its president and has been largely instrumental in its fine advancement, which is acknowledged to be the most rapid growth and development during that time since the opening of the nearly 50 Presbyterian colleges in the United States.
