HOUSE ON WHEELS LEGION BADGES FOR CONVENTION ARE NOW READY

Lacking only a doorbell and bathroom a fifty-bungalow on four wheels traveled through Medford yesterday. From the name plate on the windshield to the radio outfit and invisible kitchen, the equipment was ultra-modern.

A family of four, Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Emberson and two sons, Hubert and Maurice of Valley City, N. D., occupied the house. Since June 6 the party has driven 4842 miles.

Mr. Emberson is president of the Chevrolet agency in Valley City. Plans for the 4000-pound car were designed and constructed personally supervised by him. Complete with furnishings, the house, on a Chevrolet truck chassis with three-foot extension in length cost \$2000.

The interior of the affair was bright and cheery. A color scheme of gray, blue and orange was carried out in the costume covering on the seats, which, by the way, were movable, the folding table, camp stove and bedspread on double deckers at the rear. Four ceiling lights furnish plenty of illumination at night. Windows with ruffled orange and white curtains added to the homelike atmosphere.

Two tire extenders were carried by the travelers, who said they had never used them or had an accident of any kind on the long trip.

Over the Black Hills, through Denver, Colo.; Salt Lake City, Utah; Los Angeles, Long Beach and San Francisco, Cal., to Oregon for a glimpse of Crater Lake, the travelers had a wonderful time.

"We had a lot of fun going over the Independence pass in Colorado. At an elevation of 12,000 feet, surrounded by drifts of snow as high as our house, the four of us had to shove for over an hour before we could drive through the road in one place," the mother, who happened to be the head of the party, said.

They left here last evening for Crater Lake and expect to drive their Porter land, Ore., on to Washington before returning home.

DR. PORTER DENIES RESPONSIBILITY IN FATAL AUTO CRASH

Dr. E. H. Porter, through his attorney, Porter J. Neff, this afternoon filed his answer to the damage suit of H. F. Sanders of Medford, Cal., for \$20,000 damages for the death of his wife and injuries to himself in an auto accident in Medford county, California, on April 24 last. Sanders seeks \$15,000 for the death of his wife and \$15,000 for injuries to self.

The answer admits the main facts of the complaint, but charges that the accident was directly due to carelessness and negligence on the part of Sanders, alleging that he "drove his Ford coupe upon the intersection of the highway, making a collision unavoidable."

Dr. Porter also sets forth in his answer that his automobile was visible at all times, and "due caution was not exercised by said Sanders."

The accident occurred about 6 o'clock on the morning of April 24 on the Pacheco Pass highway. Mrs. Sanders was killed as a result of the crash and Sanders injured. Mrs. Porter of this city was also severely hurt and was brought back to her home in this city by ambulance.
