FOUND IT HARD TO GET MARRIED



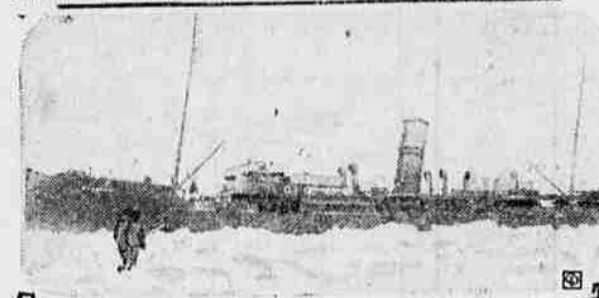

The cow, seven years old, weighs 374 pounds and is 36 inches tall. She measures only three feet from the root of the tail to the forepart of her withers, and there is only a foot between the ground and her chest. Her owner is not tall, yet the cow does not reach to his waistline.

AN HONEST WOMAN IN FRAUD CASE



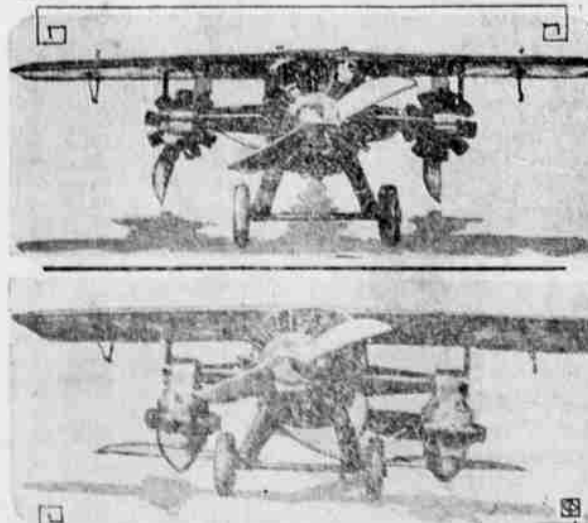

IMPROVES ON HELICOPTER IDEA



An airplane intended to save landing field space has been designed by George Lauchin, Milwaukee, Wis., mechanic. Lauchin's ship, instead of having the familiar top propeller of the helicopter, carries two pusher motors, that swing under the wings to boost the machine off the ground. Its motors virtually are the same as those which furnish the motive power for nearly all standard planes of today. Top, photo gives an idea of how the wing motors are swung back to normal position while the plane is in the air; below, the wing motors in position for taking off and landing.
