COVER SPRAY NO. 2 SHOULD BE PUT ON BY AUGUST 5

The second cover spray for second brood worms should be applied by the 5th of August. Moths are present in large numbers and are depositing eggs that will develop worms within eight to ten days. The recommended strengths of arsenate of lead to be used are as follows: For pears, two pounds, and for apples three pounds of the dry material to the 100 gallons of water.

In the application of this spray a thorough coverage is desired, particularly in the tops of trees. In case of a spider mite infestation on pears, a summer oil emulsion may be combined with the lead spray, using one to one and a half gallons of emulsion to the 100 gallons of spray. A caseinate spreader should be used in this combination. To be effective in the control of mites, this spray must be applied thoroughly to the under side of the leaves.

GROWERS ADVISED TO HAVE PEARS GIVEN FREE TEST

Bartlett pears are ripening more rapidly than most growers realize. Every grower should make use of the free service rendered by the county agent's office in testing fruit for maturity. This test will determine approximately your picking time. Select 12 specimens at random of healthy, normal fruit from the orchard so that the test will represent an average of the entire crop. This should be done in the morning while the fruit is cool. Bring the samples in immediately for testing so that the skin does not become wilted and tough. The commercial worth of fruit depends upon the time and manner of picking. Of these two the former is probably the most important for it has a direct bearing upon color, flavor, size and keeping quality. The pressure test as worked out by Oregon test station is one of the most reliable methods of determining when pears should be picked in order to obtain maximum quality. Follow the above instructions and find out where you stand in regard to picking. L. P. WILCOX, County Agent.

Harry Josephson, 40, electrician of the city light department, was killed when he fell from a pole.

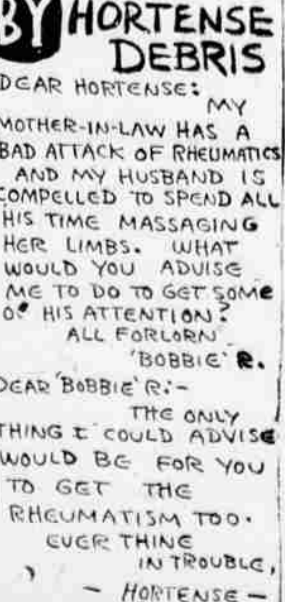
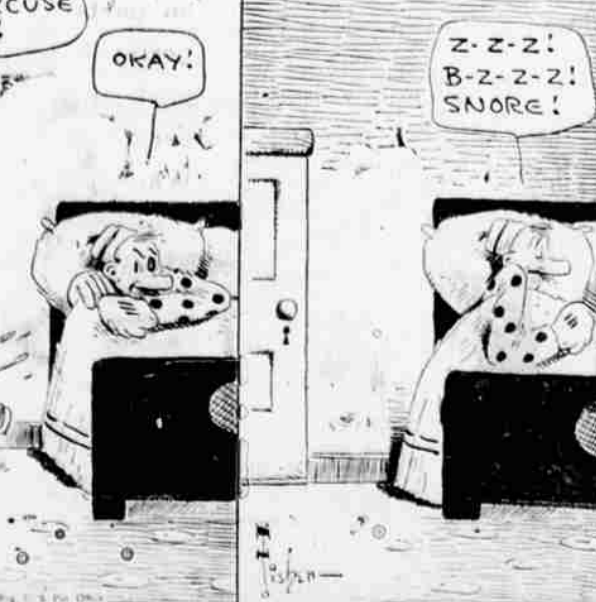
