

MEDFORD AUTO COMPANY SOLD BY DENNISON

An important announcement in automobile circles was made today by John Dennison, when he announced the sale of his business to Scherer Brothers of Jacksonville and Beloit, Wis. The deal came as an entire surprise, especially to the many friends of the Medford Auto company, of which Dennison was proprietor.

Gerald O. Scherer is here, and will be followed by his brother, Mr. Scherer will take possession on the first day of August and the new firm will be known as Scherer Motor company, and will occupy the same building at 334 1/2 North Riverside avenue that has been occupied by the Medford Auto company in the past. The Scherer Motor company has leased the building from J. H. Dennison, the owner,

who has just had the building completely refitted for the new firm. The Scherer brothers have been Buick dealers at Beloit and Janesville, Wis. for years, their father having signed his first contract with the Buick Motor company in 1905, or two years after the first Buick car was built and since that time the Scherers have been associated with Buick in Wisconsin. They were induced to come to Oregon by friends, and were impressed with Medford and vicinity, and they are very optimistic about the future here.

In taking over the business of John Dennison, Mr. Scherer states that it was part of the agreement that Dennison stay with the new firm for a few months, and devote his time to promotion of sales for the new firm, or until the Scherer Motor company becomes well known throughout the county. When asked about this, Dennison stated that he would remain in Medford for at least six months, helping the Scherer Motor company, and devoting some of his time to final settlement of many automobile contracts and accounts which he holds. Mr. Dennison stated that he had not made definite plans for the future, as the

deal had come up to completion within such a short time, and that it might be that later he would enter some other line of business here in Medford, and in the meantime was retaining his store building and home here. Mr. Dennison has been the Buick dealer in Medford for the past ten years, and altogether he has been a Buick dealer for the past 15 years, having held the Buick contract before coming to Medford, and has spent a total of 15 years handling various makes of cars.

The service on Buick cars will be continued at the Buick service station, operated by R. A. Skinner, as in the past, and Buick owners will be assured of the finest service possible. Mr. Skinner has handled the service on Buicks for the past six years for Mr. Dennison, and he has a wide reputation for real service. Ralph Gill will continue with the new firm as salesman, having acted in that capacity for several years past with the Medford Auto company.

Both Mr. Scherer and Mr. Dennison are more than optimistic about the 1928 line of Buick motor cars, and they will hold an advance showing of two of the new models next Saturday, the 28th.

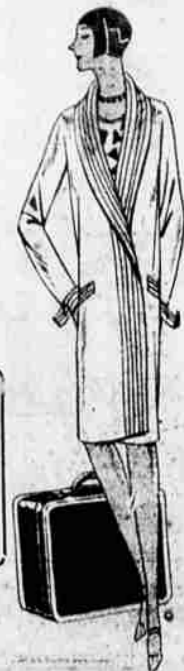
