### HOT SPELL SHOWS WHAT AN ASSET IS NEW WATER SYSTEM

An expression often heard since the present heat wave started last Saturday is that Medford people are exceedingly fortunate in having such an abundant supply of cool drinking water and for refreshing lawns and gardens. Even the small minority that had bitterly opposed the establishment of the new water system, and also those who voted grudgingly for the big water bond issue, now are glad that it carried. That water is well worth a million dollars to Medford and its people, they are quoted as saying in effect. No restrictions, green lawns, healthy green gardens, and above all, such good cold drinking water. In a heat spell like this, what would we have done without the new water supply, many are heard to say.

The weather, while still very warm, was slightly cooler yesterday with a maximum of 103 two degrees less than the maximum of Monday, and three less than that of Sunday. Today was quite warm, although much cloudiness prevailed, which kept the sun's direct heat away, lessening the discomfort, but with the same hot humidity.

So far as the weather bureau can see ahead, there is no relief in sight yet, unless a local thunder storm should come. Hence the forecast for tonight and Thursday is for a continued high temperature, low humidity and high fire hazard.

The most popular diversion of the hour, day and night, is to splash around in the commercial swimming pools of the municipalities, or in the swimming holes about the river and lesser streams.
