

CORN ON THE COB SELLING LOWER, PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—(AP)—Country dressed meats were drab today with the exception of veal, which was scarce and moved well at 21c top. Poultry was steady with receipts and demand light.

Butter and egg values were steady and unchanged at yesterday's figures. Receipts yesterday were: Butter 16,561 pounds, eggs 590 cases.

Seattle lettuce (field) was bringing \$7.75 per crate early or about 25c more than yesterday. Local dry offerings were unchanged.

Tomatoes were likewise higher, reflecting the scarcity of good stock. California tomatoes were selling from \$2.50 to \$3.50, depending on the package, while Walla Walla offerings brought as high as \$4.50 for the best stock.

Corn on the cob was in fairly plentiful supply and cheaper at \$1.75 per sack for the yellow and \$1.25 for the white varieties. Such a average from six to seven dozen ears.

Dill weed was on the market today at 10c per pound. The dill seed market was higher today, bringing 60c per box, two to two and a half dozen. Best second peas were selling at 10c per pound and green beans at 5c 1/2. Asparagus beans bringing the top.

Berry offerings were limited at most entirely to blackberries with the price hovering around \$1.25 per crate. Watermelons were higher, best grades bringing from 2 1/2c to 3c per pound.

Grapes are beginning to come from California in increasing quantities and are meeting with a fair demand on local wholesale markets. Minidoka seedling is the market favorite morning at \$2.00, while seedless and Blenheim varieties went to the trade at \$1.75 to \$2.25, depending on condition.

Citrus fruits were strong today, lemons ranging from \$7.75 on large sizes to \$9.50 on 500 and 350 size crates. Oranges were also high, selling at \$8 to \$9 per crate, depending on size. A few California grapefruit were on the market at \$1.50, but most commission houses were closed.
