

# STATE TOURIST RECORD BROKEN BY LITHIA CITY

ASHLAND, July 27.—(Special.) Ashland has broken the state record for tourist registrations. All ready at this early date, more than 19,000 tourist cars have stopped here. Never before has there been such a heavy registration during the month of June. This year there were 15,828 registrations during June. The greatest number have come from California at the south. Cars have come from every state in the union, as well as from Alaska, District of Columbia, Hawaii, Canada, England, Mexico, Porto Rico, Canal Zone, and the Philippine Islands. The following statement shows the registrations made at each of the registration stations from January 1 to June 30, 1928:

Glenn Abbott left Wednesday of last week for Diamond Lake, where he will work the remainder of the summer for the California Oregon Power company.

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
