LEGIONNAIRES TO VISIT CAVES, AND CRATER L. BY AIR

Through the co-operation of the Pacific and Kerry lines with the Medford convention committee, visiting Legionnaires at the fourth annual legion convention will be given a trip to the famous Oregon Caves Sunday and Monday, August 5 and 6. In addition to this feature, Kerry post No. 70, the "Osley post" of the state, is arranging a big five barbers at the junction of the Oregon Caves road and the Redwood highway, all day Sunday and Monday. Starting at 10 a. m. Sunday, the Kerry post of Auxiliary will put off a very attractive barbershop on both Monday night when a big Legion dinner will be staged at the Red, White and Blue pavilion.

According to reports, Cresswell City post has also offered to pick up visiting Legionnaires at the junction and take them on a trip through the redwoods. It is anticipated that a large number of visitors will take in both the Caves and the redwoods trips before returning home.

We trip to Crater Lake, the scenic wonder of the west, will be a special feature of the American Legion convention at Medford, August 2, 3 and 4. Through the co-operation of the Harkin Flying school of Portland with the Santfords Agricultural school of Medford, this novel trip will be made available during the entire convention program. A special cabin ship from Portland, a five-passenger float (one-half of the same type used by Lindbergh with an expert pilot from the Harkin school) will make the passenger trips daily from the Medford airport.

It is expected that many of the Medford convention visitors will avail themselves of the opportunity to see Crater Lake and the beauties of southern Oregon from the air.

WOMAN SCIENTIST HERE TO COLLECT FUNGI FOR COLLEGE

I am the only person in the field who is collecting fungi as far as I know," said white haired Miss Elizabeth Morse of New York this morning as she waited for the Crater Lake stage to take her to the resort where she expected to find valuable additions for the University of California herbarium.

A retired school teacher after years spent instructing high school students at the Morris and Theodore Roosevelt buildings in New York City, Miss Morse is now taking what she terms a vacation. She is employed by the University of California to do research work with fungi growing in the Pacific states. In 1924 the botanist spent the summer at Yosemite national park and last year she collected specimens at Sequoia and General Grant national parks. After leaving Crater Lake within the next few days Miss Morse will travel over Black Butte and visit Lassen park.

Miss Morse represents the California Mycological society the object of which is to collect, study and classify lower forms of plant life. She expects to make some exchanges with eastern universities after returning from this trip.

Before coming to southern Oregon she spent several weeks in the Mt. Shasta district where she found over 50 different varieties of fungi. An article by Miss Morse describing a unique puff ball which is found only in California has been accepted by the magazine edited by members of the Sierra club to which she belongs.

"Puff balls are edible if one gets them while the inside of the balls are moist," the plant collector declared, describing their flavor as equal to choice mushrooms when fried in butter.
