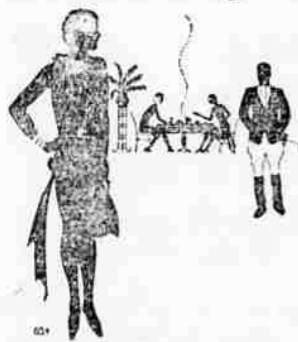

## CIGARET STUBS CAUSE 3 FIRES ON APPLIGATE SHIFT IN WIND SAVES FORESTS ON ELK CREEK

It will be surprising news to most people that the tossing away of a lighted match, cigarette or cigar stub, by tossing away carelessly out of an ash pipe on any forest land or along a country highway or private road, is an unlawful act which subjects the violator to arrest and a fine of \$75, according to a new state law.

Some swimmers, en route to or from the Appligate river last evening started another small fire along the road between Jacksonville and Finch, by tossing away carelessly a cigarette stub. This fire occurred between the two fires originating from the same source Wednesday night, and like the other fires, was extinguished by fire fighters before it had gained good headway. All three of these fires occurred in a space of 225 yards.

Another fire which started from an unknown cause in the Jacksonville-Appligate vicinity shortly before midnight last night on the right bank of Jackson creek in the Little Pacific section, which burned over 2 1/2 acres of cut-off and brush land before it was controlled early this morning by the crew of the Fred Elk logging camp, which worked all night on it. When Dwight Phipps, district fire warden and assistant arrived on the scene early this morning from Medford, all danger was past. This fire, it is understood, started in an old house and sparks from it set fire to the surrounding premises.

Still another small fire was started on the Klamath side of the Crater National forest last evening afternoon when during an electrical storm lightning struck a tree. This fire was discovered by the Chinese mountain lookout near Keno, and was easily put out by two forest employees.

The section of the law making it unlawful to throw away lighted cigarettes, cigars and matches, etc., reads in part as follows: "It shall be unlawful, during the closed season, for any one to throw away any lighted tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, matches, fire-sticks, or other lighted article, on any forest land, private road, public highway or railroad right of way within this state."

### Little Girls Who Plan to Parade Asked to Sign Up

All girls who expect to enter doll parades in the parade which will be held at the fairgrounds next Thursday, August 2, in the afternoon following the American Legion aerial display, are requested to call at the playgrounds off East Main and sign up with Miss Stella Williams, director, or her assistant, Miss Marjorie Kelly, as soon as possible. The youngsters will be cared for by members of the Boy Scout organization. In addition to the doll show, there is to be a pet parade with both boys and girls taking part. Anything from cats to monkeys will be acceptable and there is no age limit for entrants.

The 25-pondary fire started in the Elk Creek-creek section of the Crater National forest in the Box road some vicinity late Wednesday night and early Thursday a mile or so from steel timber, and which so long threatened to become a very serious forest conflagration, was extinguished under control this morning and the Crater National forest headquarters office here began this forenoon pulling back to the city by small detachments, as the danger gradually grew less, squads of the many fire fighters sent in to the scene yesterday, but leaving an ample number to patrol the scene to see that the fire did not break out again.

A fortunate shift in the wind prevailing at the fire scene between 2:30 and 4 p. m. yesterday afternoon was all that prevented a further disastrous spread of the fire. As it was, over 100 acres of brush and grass were burned over with little commercial damage. The only buildings burned were an old house and barn, and one-fourth of a mile rail fence was burned.

Attending this big fire, a series of 35 consecutive fires within a radius of three miles, a fortunate one in several respects—chiefly in the fact that the fire, when discovered so quickly in their incipient stage by a Cooper trans-sion line patrolman and reported to the nearest forest lookout station, which at once notified the forest headquarters in Medford, enabling the latter to get crews of experienced fire fighters on the job so soon.

Garden slugs are controlled by applying a combination spray and poison bait. City J. Wilcox, assistant entomologist of the Oregon experiment station. A broad-spectrum spray of 4-1-50 strength is first sprinkled over the plants. Bait made of one ounce of chlordane acetate mixed with one pound of chopped lettuce leaves is scattered around the infested plants in small heaps. Chlordane poison bran mixed with acetone acetate in the poison, also may be used.

### Farm Pointers

It is almost time to cull the ewe flock, reminds H. A. Lindgren, extension specialist. Ewes are culled on age, health, ability as lamb raisers and their wool production. Dry ewes or those that did not have lambs this season are marked. If they fail to produce for two seasons in succession, it is a good idea to get rid of them. Dry ewes in a flock reduce the percentage of lambs weaned. There are usually more of them present than the flock owner realizes.
