PETITIONS SEEK CONCRETE PAVING; COUNCIL UPHELD

Trouble is brewing for the city administration because of having awarded the contract to pave six Medford streets, this week, to the Herold Paving company of Oregon City, the lowest of a number of bidders by \$2400, for six-inch surfacing of the black top asphalt type of paving, because of dissatisfaction of some of the property owners on those streets, who prefer for the concrete type of paving, and also having the contract given to a local bidder.

Property owners on Holly, Spencer and Arcadia streets in their petition presented to the city council to have their streets paved, had specified concrete paving, and it is understood with some of the owners on the other three streets have started a petition asking that the city council disavow the Herold company bid, and have rebidding with only concrete specified.

The property owners of Portland, Park and Almonds streets, in their petitions asking for street paving, did not specify what kind of paving they wanted.

In talking this afternoon of the objections raised by some of the property owners of the three streets to the Herold company winning bid for asphalt black top surfacing and their circulating petitions for concrete paving, Mayor Alenderfer was very emphatic in his comments of these objections.

He stated the city council was well within its rights and morally bound in accepting the bid to the Herold company, the lowest bidder, and that such action had only been taken by the city officials after a thorough study of all the bids and of the respective merits of both the concrete and black top paving, after which they found that the bid for the latter type was the best one.

The mayor said that the government and state statistics, as well as other information coming from the municipalities where the black top type was in use, disclosed that it is a paving of superior merit and long wear, and besides was cheaper than concrete, as shown in the bids submitted.

The objecting property owners simply did not understand the situation, the mayor said, and were leading misrepresentations made to them.

Mayor Alenderfer also declared that even if the property owners who were objecting presented a petition to the city council, it would not be accepted, such petition would not influence the city council to make any change in the Herold bid, but he would accept as the lowest and best the bid of the week, and was legally binding on the city council, even though it had not yet been formally signed.
