Mrs. Camilla Owen and daughter, Mrs. Mirtle Parker, were Medford visitors on Thursday.

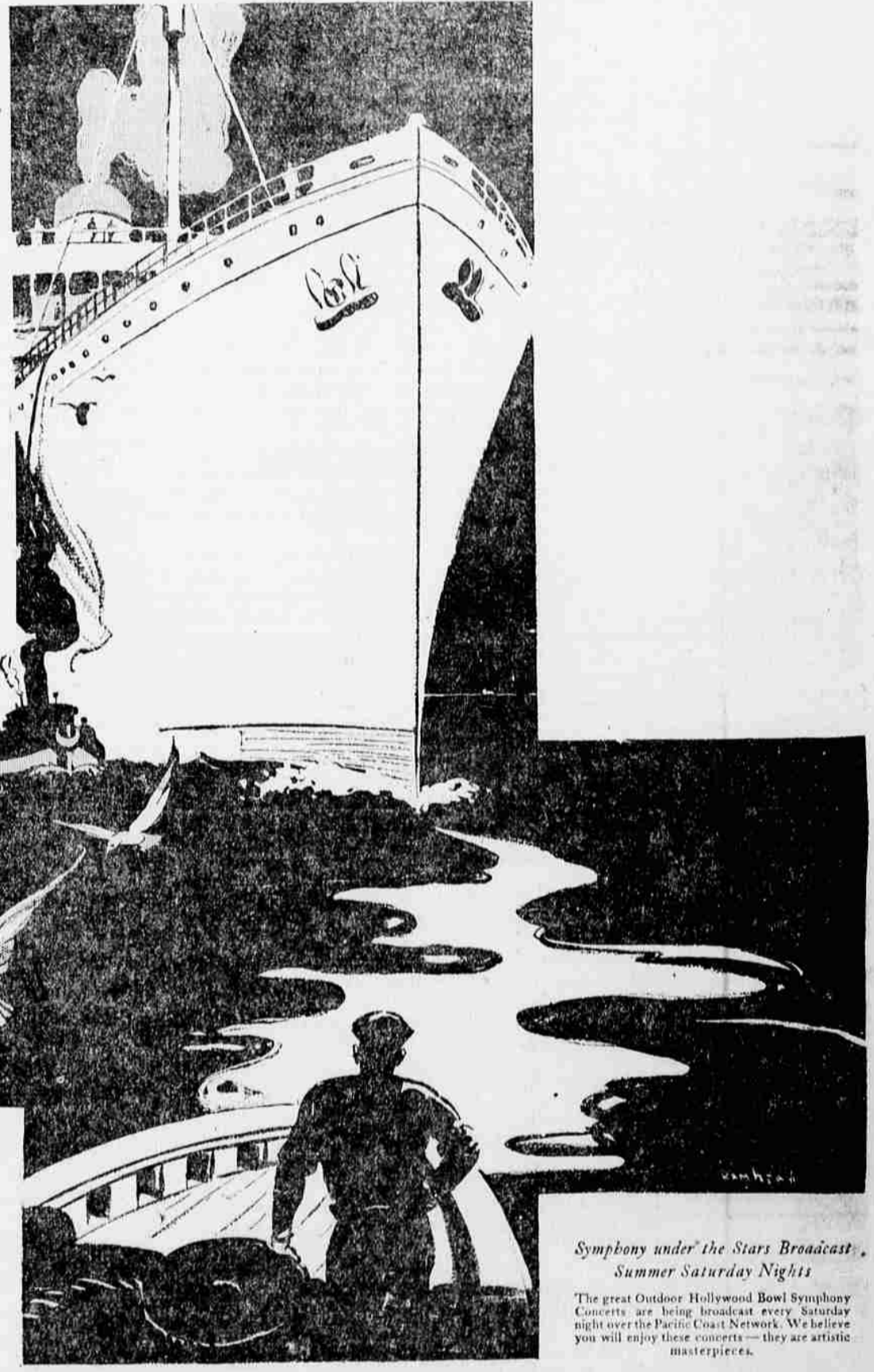
George Plaisted from the Cove district was calling on friends in this vicinity on Thursday.
