Henderson and Woodberry claim they were making the beer for private consumption and were not selling it. However, officers claim that the two men were in the home-selling business, inasmuch as two of them, Talbot and Worden, had placed an order for a case of beer last week. The homebrew was contained in 17 cases and is said to have sold around nine dollars a case.
