CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 1.—The weather-whipped hot that was home to August Kessler for 26 years; that was good enough, with his credit altar, to serve as his church; and good enough, too, in dire emergency, to be put to use as a morgue for the body of his aged housekeeper, was burned last night as a public nuisance.

Into the flames went the rafter from which the police yesterday had probed a bullet and from which had been suspended a shotgun and a vicious looking sword. Its blade stained as though by blood. Into the flames, too, went the recluse's bed beneath which on Monday of Deers had found a crude coffin in which was the body of Kessler's cousin, Claudia Haupt, dead since April.

The bullet, the sword, the woman's body were a reminiscence that aroused police suspicion and led them to investigate Kessler's activities as a self-appointed priest to a small group of worshippers. One by one, however, the various theories were dissipated. Officers today had the report of Dr. Axel Benson that Miss Haupt had died a natural death. Reports that one of more persons had disappeared after visiting the hermitage church in the forest preserve were found to be without foundation.

Kessler, confined to a hospital where he is recovering from wounds resulting from an attack upon him early Sunday, would add nothing to his previous story. Miss Haupt, he said, had died without medical attention because there were no funds to obtain it. Her body had been kept in the hut until such time as there would be money enough to provide burial.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Prohibition authorities estimated today that it cost them between \$65,000 and \$75,000 to obtain evidence, which they believe will dry up Broadway.
