ALLEGED LOCAL BOOTLEGGERS IS GRABBED BY COP

While watching the Pacific highway last night for suspected bootleggers, Terry Tolent of this district and C. L. Warden of Portland, federal prohibition agents, intercepted near Talent the new Durant coupe car of J. H. Higley of Medford, who had with him a woman by the name of Sergeant, found four gallons of moonshine and 13 cans of supposed blended liquor. The arresting officers claimed the booze was destined for Medford consumption.

Both were placed under arrest and today were to be arraigned before Justice of the Peace Roberts at Ashland. It was the second arrest here for Higley, he having been arrested the first of this year by the police on a possession charge and sentenced to 30 days in jail and a \$200 fine.

The first case of petty larceny or burglary of the week occurred last night when some of two convention visitors at the Hotel Medford, were entered and the pockets of each were rifled of \$15.

The victims were Muelc Hitchcock and Earle Burton, each of whom reported to lock the door of their room on retiring.

The police again warn Medford people to lock up their homes, securely on leaving them for an hour or so, and ask neighbors to keep an eye on the houses while they are gone, for professional sneak thieves usually visit towns during large conventions.

PICKPOCKETS HERE ROB TWO LEGION MEN

distress signals from the Courtney plane at 8:30 a. m. Greenwich meaning, which corresponds to 4:30 eastern standard time.

500 Miles From Land.

If this message was sent at about the airplane was forced down, Captain Courtney had been flying 14 hours and 25 minutes. He had expected to maintain a flying speed of 100 miles an hour, which would have brought him at the hour he was forced down to within 400 miles of his goal. The position given in the radio messages, however, indicated that he was at least 100 miles further from land. It was apparent that the winds had cut down his speed.

A later radio message, relayed by way of Cape Haze, Newfoundland, indicated that an American liner, the President Hayes, might be the first of the ships to reach the stricken plane. The President Hayes was reported rushing under full speed toward the spot where the plane came down and hoped to reach the stricken plane by 11 a. m.

A message received by the Radio Marine corporation at 9:10 eastern standard time, from the liner Penland, said that at that hour both the British steamer Minnowaska and the President Hayes were proceeding toward the Courtney plane.

It was pointed out in explanation of the fact that so many ocean steamships found themselves near the disabled plane that Captain Courtney had come down very near the southern steamship route from New York to European ports.

Both the Minnowaska and President Hayes are westbound.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—(AP) The Spanish seaplane Naranjo, piloted by Major Ramon Franco, was in part again today after having been forced down by engine trouble on the first leg of a trans-Atlantic flight. The plane was forced down off the Portuguese coast, after touching Huelva, Spain, about 20 miles from Cadix, the starting point. Today Major Franco and his three companions were eager to renew their flight to America.

Major Franco, with Captain Ruiz de Alda, navigator; Emilio Gallardo, co-pilot, and Pablo Rada, mechanic, hopped off from Cadix at 7:45 a. m. yesterday on a flight which was intended to take them around the world in 42 days in their four-motored seaplane. They headed for the Azores and intended to go from there to New York by way of Halifax.

During the afternoon, however, motor trouble developed and the airman came down safely off the Portuguese coast. They made their way back to Huelva and the plane was anchored in the Rio Odier. The airman spent the night at the Habana monastery, which was a haven for Christopher Columbus before his voyages to America.

RESPECT FOR DRY LAW DECLARED A SUPREME ISSUE

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass. Aug. 2.—(AP)—Respect for the prohibition laws which are on the statute books, fair play for the farmers and international cooperation, were listed here today by Harry Garfield, president of Williams college and chairman of the institute of politics, as issues upon which the voters of the country were entitled to opinions from candidates for office.

Dr. Garfield was making the convention address at the opening of the eighth annual session of the institute of politics at Williamstown.

"Certain questions having come up," Garfield said, "like Prohibition, which they will not down. They cannot be put aside by sophistries of peddlers in the interests of politicians. The people of the country demand an answer. The voters of the United States have come of age and are thinking for themselves to the consternation of those who have heretofore assumed dictatorship of political action."

"It is true, as political leaders have to say, that prohibition is not a political question, but respect for law is," Dr. Garfield said. "Prohibition is primarily a moral and social problem. Until enacted into law it presents a personal problem only."

GANGSTERS MUST GO, DECLARES NEW CHIEF OF POLICE

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The gang plans in the nation's platform of Chicago's new police commissioner, William P. Russell, is daily for the president at the edge of the large open pit mines near here.

A picture of industrial activity awaited the presidential visit.

Huge hoists sunk into the earth, resembling sails of giants, with falls, engines and tire cars on each tier of steps; steam shovels picking up with apparent ease tons of "red dirt," placing them in cars and going back for more, making still more and deeper tiers; figures of men, appearing on the other side of the bowl like ants crawling in and out of a sand pile—all of this and more could be seen from the observation platforms, built especially for the president at the edge of the large open pit mines near here.

Criminals and departmental inefficiency are the two things a commissioner, who took office yesterday, is out to conquer.

"Each must go," he said, "or I will. Mayor Thompson has made me understand that if I fail, it will be my own fault."

The commissioner would not discuss methods he intends to employ, and was reticent regarding any departmental changes he may contemplate.

Doing the head of the Chicago police department is a manhandling job," he said. "It has cost the health of nearly all of my predecessors."
