MAN INJURED IN AUTO COLLISION HERE, IS ROBBED

Although there have been a number of minor auto accidents—collisions and fender bumpings and the like—during the past two days because of the many hundreds of non-resident cars in the city, incidental to the American Legion convention, the most serious accident reported occurred about 10:20 p. m., last night on Sixth street near the City Hall, when the car of a man known as J. Johnson of Sams Valley collided with that of E. R. Sheldon of the state highway department. Both cars were badly wrecked, and Johnson was taken to the Sacred Heart hospital suffering with bad bruises. The man who was driving his car and whose identity is unknown to Johnson or the police, disappeared immediately after the accident and has not been found since.

Sheldon and the unknown man both escaped injury.

Johnson declines all knowledge of his erstwhile companion's identity. All he remembers about the matter is that he had been in at 10:20 in the back seat of his own car after his collision and found that all his money and valuables had disappeared.
