### IMPORTANCE OF MUSIC STRESSED BY AUXILIARY

Melodious music by various Auxiliary units in various forms during the past year have included dancing parties, poppy sales, bridge parties, community dances, letter-writing classes and musical affairs. Mrs. Helen Aiken, general chairman of the Medford commission, reported today.

Mrs. William Horsfall, music chairman of Medford, Ore., stressed the importance of music in the nation as a factor for good. The following list of units maintaining musical efforts was read by her: Bond Enterprise, Heppner, Hood River, Lakeview, Marshfield, McMinnville, Roseburg, Seaside, Seaside and St. Helens. Mrs. Horsfall recommended that winners of today's musical contests be sent to the national convention next year.

A long list of resolutions read by Mrs. Newton Chaney, member of the Medford unit, included a recommendation that Portland should have an Auxiliary center building for the headquarters of several departments such as the state welfare commission and the hospital department. It was decided that a committee should be appointed to investigate this matter. Another resolution pertained to the benefits of the Auxiliary co-operating with other civic clubs.

The most important business scheduled for tomorrow, Saturday, is the selection of state officials, which will take place during the morning session which convenes from 8 o'clock until noon.

### Sidelights on the Convention

Fred F. Bebergall "My hobby is Legion work, but to keep down the suspicions of the police, I work in the composing room of the Oakland (Cal.) Tribune," said Fred F. Bebergall. "I prefer the work that aids the community. Many of the posts have built airports and emergency landing fields. Almost every post sponsors a Boy Scout troop, some posts having as many as four. Twenty-three per cent of the Boy Scout troops sponsored by the Legion are in California. Work is also done for the Girl Scouts and the Camp Fire Girls."

This department of the Legion is also interested in the playgrounds, schools, beautifying the parks and streets by planting shrubbery, and the cleanliness of the city. Athletic fields have also been built.

Mr. Bebergall was the organizer of the Auxiliary in California, in 1920, when he was state adjutant. He also had the pleasure of being the first member of the 40 et 8 of California, and also the first grand chief.

William McCracken "I guess aviation is my hobby, even though it is almost getting to be my profession," said William McCracken, assistant secretary of commerce of the United States, "but I am still a lawyer."

Mr. McCracken was a pilot during the war, although he didn't go overseas. He is personally acquainted with Colonel Lindbergh, and knew him when he flew the Atlantic. When Lindbergh was flying the mail plane he made two parachute jumps. It was through this feat that Mr. McCracken became acquainted with him.

"I think the best way to enjoy your scenery here is from the air," stated Mr. McCracken. "I flew up the Columbia river to Hood River, and then from Portland to Medford. I certainly enjoyed the scenery more this trip than I ever did before."

Phil Metschan, Et Al Fred Steiwer, United States senator; Judge R. B. Butler of Dallas, Ore.; and Phil Metschan, chairman of the republican state central committee, were all encountered at the Hotel Medford yesterday, and agreed to tell their hobbies, and why they can't tell each other's. "Judge Butler, here, loves to hear the wind passing through the fields of wheat, and rustling through the pine leaves, as it reminds him of what he sounds like when he makes speeches in Washington," said Phil Metschan. Fred Steiwer told of Judge Butler's political work. He is republican nominee for congress to take the place of Mr. Shoup, who was recently appointed to a judicial position. According to the trio, Judge Butler is running "unopposed," only being challenged by Walter Pierce.

Mr. Metschan, who seemed quite willing to talk for the others, offered a few remarks about Sam Koser, secretary of state, who happened along at that time. "Mr. Koser is not privileged to wear a soldier's badge, although most people think he is a soldier, so he doesn't wear one." Phil Metschan asked the secretary if he hadn't gained the impression that he owned the state house, after living in it so long. This query was answered in the negative.

"Mr. Metschan is the president of the Imperial hotel in Portland," said Fred Steiwer, "but he also serves as manager, clerk and bell boy."

Mr. Steiwer's hobby was also submitted by the "Spokesman." "I think he enjoys fishing and hunting in the Blue mountains better than anything else," he said.

The trio came to the city with Phil Metschan as chauffeur, much to the uneasiness of the senator.

### NICE SOUVENIR OF CHEAPER AIR MAIL RECEIVED

A nice souvenir, which in years to come may prove to be very valuable for a stamp collector, was received by air mail at the Medford postoffice today, addressed to Ralph Verdun, the Pacific Air Transport company pilot, who resides in Medford and who pilots one of the PAT ships between Medford and San Francisco.

The souvenir sent to him consists of an air mail letter mailed August 1st from Great Falls, Montana, the stamp on which not only commemorates the inauguration on August 1st of the cheaper national air mail postage, but was one of the first letters to be mailed from Great Falls on the new air mail line from between that city and Salt Lake City, Utah, that began to function August 1.

But the big feature of this souvenir, is that on the envelope every air mail pilot, who handled the letter from the time it left Great Falls until it reached Medford, inscribed his name on the envelope. The letter on leaving Great Falls went over the new air mail line to Salt Lake City where it connected at the latter city with the transcontinental air mail line to Los Angeles, where it was transferred again to the Pacific Air Transport line, was brought to San Francisco and then to Medford.

A Tip From Victoria, B. C.

To the Editor: Press dispatches carry an interesting story of Herbert Hoover's recent fishing trip on the Rogue. Oregon's most famous steelhead stream. At a speed of 40 miles per hour he was driven to the private lodge of "Taggers" Bill Isaacs where great preparations had been made to insure the candidate a "good time." All day republican game wardens "patrolled" the river and chased all fishermen away from the favorite pools of the Rogue. The state game warden himself was in charge. Members of the state game commission were on hand and issued free licenses to the party. Here on every side they say "how like old England." And after the steelhead had refused to rise to his fly Hoover said "no I have not had a good time," and left the stream "peeved" while many steelhead smiled.

The circumstances are prophetic. They seem to indicate that under the Hoover administration the common people will be driven further from the favorite pools. Special privilege will control. Opportunities will be open to the few,
