ASHLAND LEGION FLOAT WILL BE A BIG FEATURE

ASHLAND, Aug. 2.—The huge float prepared by the Ashland post of the American Legion will be transported to Medford about 2 o'clock Saturday morning, when traffic on the Pacific highway is at a low ebb. The problem of moving a float with a 25-foot lateral expansion caused considerable discussion and was only solved when A. W. Moon of the Moon Lumber company offered the use of a sub-berthed tractor to pull the float along the highway. Several members of the Legion will accompany the float to warn traffic ahead until the passing of the huge car. The float has been prepared by the Legion at a cost of \$120, which was raised by public subscription.

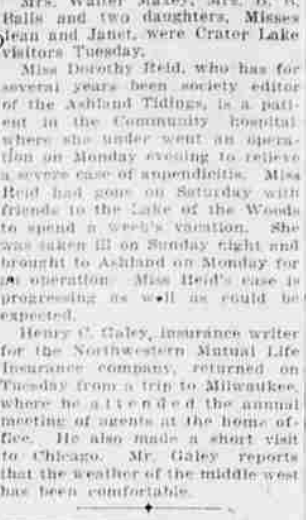

CHRISTIAN END. WILL SUPPORT HERBERT HOOVER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—The republican national headquarters, in a press announcement here today, said the "support of the Society of the Christian Endeavor was pledged to Herbert Hoover today by Dr. Daniel A. Pollak, president of the society, who called on Chairman Hubert Work.

The Christian Endeavor is a Protestant church organization composed of young people and connected largely with the Presbyterian faith. The announcement quoted Dr. Pollak as having declared "We will be in the campaign straight through. We will be positive rather than negative."

Dr. Pollak was also quoted as having said there were "constitutional, legal and moral considerations that lift the campaign out of state conventions of the society. Dr. Pollak said, resolutions were passed favoring Hoover.

DUNNE BILL HEARING BEING HELD TODAY

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 2.—Arguments will be heard by Judge L. J. McMahan today in the injunction proceedings brought against Secretary of State Kozer to restrain him from placing the Dunne automobile license reduction bill on the November ballot. Senator Dunne has repudiated the measure, but since sufficient signatures were obtained on the petitions to put the bill on the ballot, it can be removed only by court action, and possibly not by that means.
