

FIRE INSURANCE AGENTS OF STATE TO MEET MONDAY

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 4.—(AP)—A statewide organization of fire insurance agents is to be effected at a meeting called in Salem Monday by Homer H. Smith, president of the Oregon Insurance Agents' union.

Fire insurance and allied lines will be embraced in the organization, and the object, it is stated, is standardization of the insurance underwriting profession and the protection of the interest both of agent and insured.

Preliminary organization was effected at meetings called a few months ago at The Dalles and at Roseburg, and already about 200 agents are enrolled. Several hundred agents and adjusters are expected here.

A live state insurance commissioner will be one of the speakers.

POSTAL DEFICIT IS DUE TO CONGRESS DEFEATING VETOS

SUPREMACY, Wis., Aug. 4.—(AP)—President Coolidge fears that many of the postal rates will have to be increased to balance the heavy post office department deficit, which has been estimated for the fiscal year 1929. For this contingency he blames congress to a large extent.

As for the reasons underlying the deficit, Mr. Coolidge points to the various bill increasing postal expenditures which he has vetoed in the course of the past few years and which congress insisted on passing over his objections. At the last session congress overrode his veto on two measures, one allowing a ten per cent increase in salary to night workers and another allowing sundry expenses to fourth class postmasters. In 1924 congress rejected his veto on the general postal pay increase bill, which raised by very large sums the expenditures of the department.

COOS BAY BOOSTS EAST AND WEST RAIL ROAD LINE, OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Construction of the proposed east-west railroad across Oregon would make the land between Coos Bay and Chicago about 200 miles shorter. A. P. Davis, secretary of the Marshfield chapter of commerce, and former Coos Bay representative of the Pacific lumber inspection bureau, testified at the hearing on the line before the interstate commerce commission today.

Such a reduction in the haul should mean a substantial cut in freight charges, Mr. Davis said. Freight was a big item in shipment of lumber by rail, he added.

He gave detailed figures on lumber traffic originating in the district tributary to Coos Bay.

Shipments had been below normal for two or three years, he said, but a comeback of the lumber market was indicated now and he expected 1928 and 1929 to be normal years.
