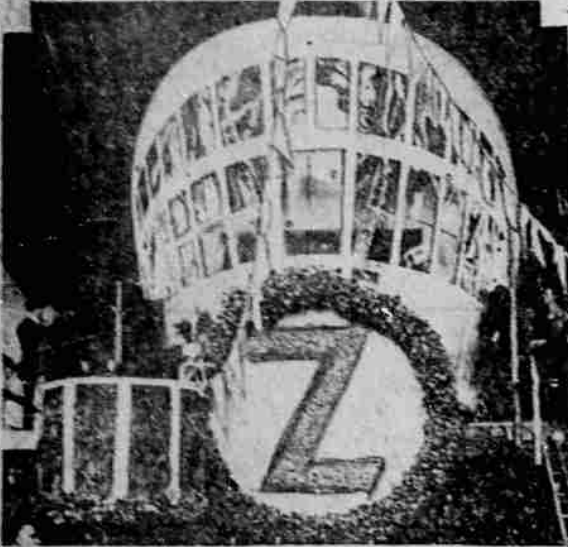
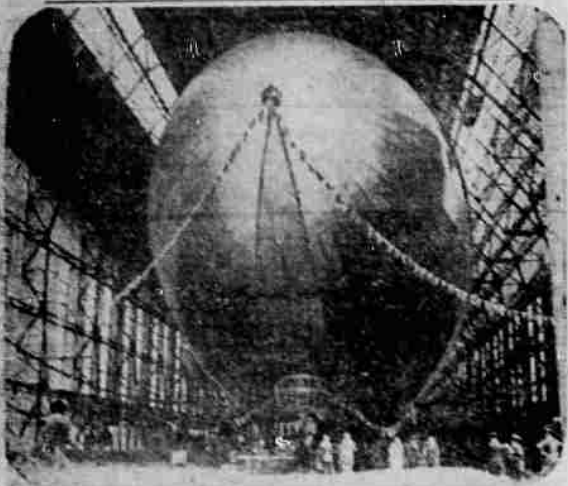

REPUBLICAN WOMEN PREPARE FOR HOOVER CAMPAIGN



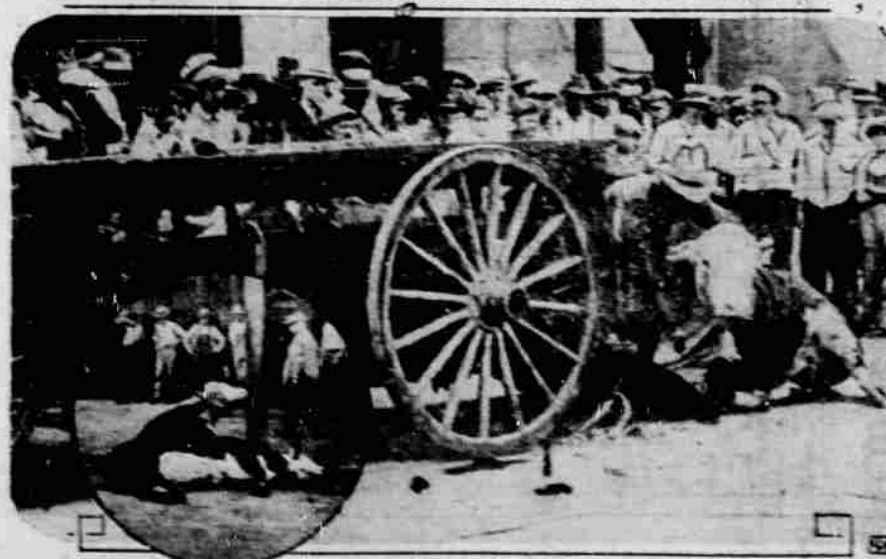

STEERS BREAK SUMMER MONOTONY IN KANSAS CITY



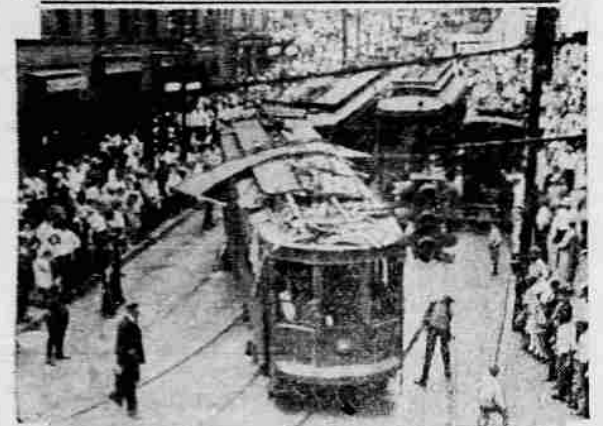

ARRESTED GIRL HAS DUAL NATURE



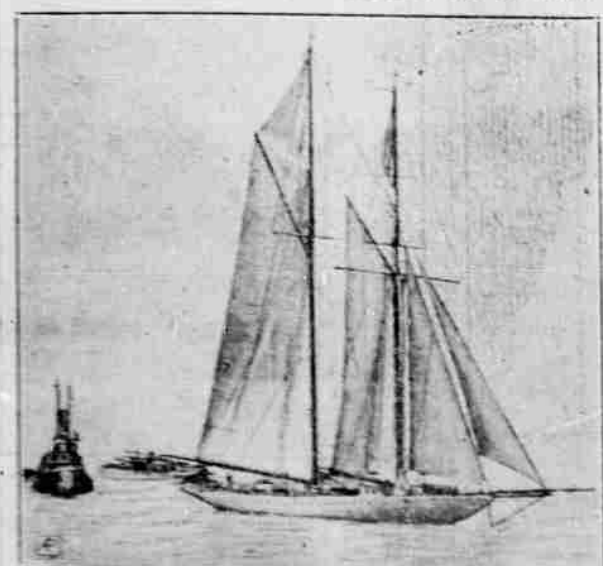
