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WILL HOOVER BREAK THE SOLID SOUTH?

CONDITIONS must be pretty desperate in the South when the Democratic party has to go back to the Civil war for an issue. Senator Pat Harrison is now followed by the governor of South Carolina who makes an impassioned plea for the Southern people to vote for Al Smith because Tammany espoused the cause of slavery and rebellion back in the days of '61

This may be good politics in Dixie land for the South has never forgotten the Civil war while the North, politically speaking, forgot it a generation ago. But we believe it is poor politics in the country at large and Senator Moses is justified in his assumption that the Democrats in the South are seared to death and generally demoralized. Certainly such a plea, can only be founded upon fear and desperation.

In fact as the weeks pass by it is becoming more and more apparent, that the Republican party this year, has the best chance of breaking the solid South it has had since the party was organized.

This does not mean the solid South will be broken. But the chance is there and the extraordinary behaviour of the Southern Democratic leaders proves it.

AL SMITH AGREES WITH HOOVER

WELL, WELL! Al Smith joins President Coolidge, Secretary Hoover, and other so-called enemies of the poor farmer in opposing the McNary bill method of farm aid.

"I am opposed to the equalization fee," says Governor Smith—the identical words used by President Coolidge in his veto message.

This makes it rather embarrassing for those farmers who stormed the Kansas City convention, and demanded the nomination of Lowden because he stood for the equalization fee. Some of them went to Houston and maintained the Democrats gave them what they wanted.

Apparently they were mistaken. For Mr. Lowden publicly declared "farm relief without the equalization fee is as impossible as a protective tariff without a tariff schedule."

Too bad. We fear the disgruntled agrarians of the corn belt will have to vote the Republican ticket or stay away from the polls altogether.

SMITH CAN'T HELP THE FARMER

THIS stand by Governor Smith should establish the fact that the Republican administration, was entirely correct in its opposition to the McNary-Haugen bill, for if the measure did not violate the basic principles of good government and sound business, the Democratic nominee undoubtedly would have supported it.

Such a decision is interesting from another angle for it shows the dilemma Governor Smith faces. He must hold New York state, and to hold it he must sweep New York City by an overwhelming majority.

But the interests of New York City and the interests of the American farmer, are not only dissimilar but opposed. New York City not only is hostile to farm relief such as the McNary bill provides, but also opposes a protective tariff, for farm products, and the present federal restrictions on immigration.

New York City wants cheaper labor and a more abundant supply of it. Union labor and the corn belt are opposed to both.

It is interesting to note that Governor Smith, forced to choose between pleasing the farm vote, and holding the big city vote, promptly threw his support to the latter.

This situation should open the eyes of some of the Mid-West malcontents who plan to vote for Smith as a gesture of protest. If they don't see it now, they will later, that by such action, they literally (in homely but effective phrase) bite off their nose to spite their face.

Mr. Walker Hails the Hollywood Morn.

From Hollywood comes word that Mayor Jimmy Walker, resting there after his labors at Houston, rose late on the Fourth of July and did not breakfast until noon. To those who did not witness the mayor's activities at the Democratic convention, or are unaware of the tremendous responsibility that rested upon him there, these hours may indicate the vice of the sluggard. The imputation would be unjust.

His honor is catching up his lost sleep, or trying to. At Houston there was no sleep for any conscientious statesman, and the mayor is no slacker. He worked hard by day, and when Chairman Robinson became exhausted heaped into the breach and made the motion to adjourn. Even then he was not for him; in his weakened state he went, with scarce a pause for breath, to the labors of the South vineyard in the Blue hotel and there shook hands until all bedholders marvelled at his endurance. Others faltered and many wilted; he walked in beauty like the night of cloudless skies and starry skies, and all that best of dark and light met in the aspect of his ties, thus mellowed to that tender light which heaven to a gaudy day denies. And when the cooling shades of eve appeared forsook not the paths of industry, as did the trivial, but went into conference with George W. Olvany of the Columbian order of New York to charitable and patriotic organization with headquarters in Fourteenth street and worked until the elevators stopped and the electric current could be switched to the fans.

Those who knew of these labors will not carp at his honor for rising at noon in Hollywood; it will be many days and perhaps weeks before the mayor gets back to that punctuality which is the politeness of kings and mayors. Even in New York, when he gets back there, the city hall may not look to see him at his desk at his usual hour (which is said to be 4 o'clock in the afternoon). The reaction after the Houston ordeal will be slow in wearing off.

Even the delegates who did not work nearly so hard as Mayor Walker did will be unfitted for ordinary pursuits for a long time. Many of them were worn to haggardness before the final judgment came, and they had virtually no hands left to do and went into no conferences. Several of them were heard to admit they didn't know what the convention had done, was doing or was going to do. Yet even these were plumb wore out, as they frankly said. They would gladly go to Hollywood and sleep until noon, having all criticism for sluggishness. Alas, so few of them can do so. They have had to go home and go to work.

The heat they can do will be to complain of being tired, and in this plaint will get little sympathy or understanding from their neighbors who listened to the radio and rattled to hear anything indicating that the delegates took part in the proceedings.—Kansas City Star.

CLAIMS PRIMARY SHOWS AL SMITH WILL LOSE TEXAS

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Thomas B. Love, Texas anti-Smith leader and candidate for lieutenant governor, declared in a statement issued here last night that "few things can be more certain than that if all the democrats who voted for me in last Saturday's primary vote against Al Smith in November, he will lose Texas electoral vote."

The former state senator was the only state candidate to actively fight the election of Governor Alfred E. Smith, who survived the democratic primary.

He was one of the organizers of the national ticket "60" in the state, and ran second for the nomination.

Barry, incumbent, polled 394,621 votes, Love 199,298, and about 12,000 votes were scattered among the other candidates. Miller and Love will enter a run-off primary August 22.

"Of the 700,000 votes cast," Love declared, "more than 100,000 were given me with the distinct knowledge and understanding that I am opposed to Governor Smith."

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SON OF WEALTHY PARENTS HELD FOR MURDER OF GIRL

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Russell St. Clare Barholme, 27, believed to be a member of a prominent Philadelphia family, was held for investigation by police today following finding of the nude body of a girl in the mountains north of Hollywood. Police said Barholme lived unwell with the girl here after bringing her from Philadelphia. She had been dead several months.

Police took Barholme to the spot where the body, badly torn by wild animals, was found last night. He denied knowledge of her death, which was caused apparently by a bullet wound in the head. Officers said Barholme had reported three months ago that she was missing. Police said they had information that the girl had been well known in Philadelphia social circles.
