

C. E. GATES BUYS PROPERTY FOR NEW BUILDING

The lot and 18-room dwelling house at the corner of North Riverside avenue and 15th street has been purchased by the C. E. Gates Auto company. The property belongs to Mrs. Jane Kent and the purchase was considerably in excess of \$15,000.

The site was purchased by C. E. Gates for use in the event that the structure, now occupied by the Kent property, is sold. Two or three flats are still pending for the purchase of the present quarters.

The Kent property has an entrance on three streets, and is particularly well adapted for automobile purposes.

Mr. Gates plans to later move the dwelling to a side street, and convert it into an apartment. He has received an offer of \$1500 per month for use of the Kent property as a service station, but declined the offer.

Regarding the proposed sale of the Gates substation, Mr. Gates knows nothing definite. He said that the building and location had become too valuable for sale.

CHURCH LEASED FOR OVERFLOW LOCAL SCHOOLS

In preparation to take care of whatever overflow from the crowd of Junior high school children that may occur during the next two years, or until a new Junior high school building can be built and occupied, Superintendent of Schools E. H. Hedrick and the school board have just completed a financial deal, which they regard as a very economical one for the public.

PUGET SOUND IS SHAKEN BY TNT SHIP EXPLOSION

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 7.—(AP)—(Managed homes, blasted trees, a huge depression in the hills above the narrow and tiny bits of wreckage floating in with the morning tide, and a scene of the explosion which wrecked the cargo ship La Blanca near Point Fosdick last night. The damage will aggregate thousands of dollars.

By good fortune and good judgment, Nels Christensen, captain of the boat, not only saved his life and that of his son, Nels, but beached the boat, which was afire, at a point where as few lives as possible were endangered.

The La Blanca, 29.5 feet long, loaded with 210 cases of dynamite and 22 cases of black powder, was bound from the powder works at Dupont to Kenydale, 30 1/2 miles Washington, when she caught fire in a mysterious manner near Point Fosdick. The fire was not discovered for some minutes by Christensen, who was in the cabin.

When he saw the fire get out of control and realized that an explosion was a matter of minutes Christensen headed for shore. He leashed the boat and with his son ran as fast as he could down the beach. The father and son were about 1000 feet away when the explosion came with a deafening detonation. Before beaching the boat, Christensen waved away several daring men who came nearby in motor boats to offer assistance. Warning his would-be rescuers of the cargo of high explosives, the powder boat captain asked them to get out of danger.

A group of about 20 people stood on the shore at Tilow beach and watched the launch as it was swept by flames. The fire, according to witnesses, was of unusual brilliance and caused a terrific smoke.

When the blast came it rocked the entire city of Tacoma and at Tilow beach the force was terrific. Witnesses were almost thrown from their feet while windows throughout the district, as well as in the rest of the city, were broken.

As the smoke cleared away, not a trace of the powder boat was visible and several speed boats were immediately rushed from the Tilow beach side to the scene of the explosion.

It is estimated that plate glass worth \$1000 was shattered in downtown stores seven miles from the scene of the explosion. Practically all the windows in Dog Island and Tilow beach, within the nearest two blocks, were broken.

The blast was heard in Seattle, 10 miles away.

COOLIDGE TO VETO MONEY GRAB BILLS

SUPERIOR, Wis., Aug. 7.—(AP)—President Coolidge is preparing to veto at the next session of congress any bills carrying appropriation which would threaten the balance of the budget.

He was informed yesterday by General Lord that the large appropriations already made by congress and the possible reduction in revenues owing to last session's tax cut, pointed to a possible, although unlikely, deficit of \$100,000,000 on next June 30.

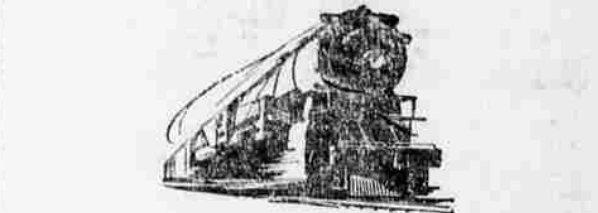
