THE NEWSPAPER AND THE CRIMINAL

IN one direction Los Angeles seems to be achieving its ambition to be known as a great American metropolis. In the direction of continuous and shocking crime, it may be classed a close third to New York City and Chicago.

When some prominent society woman is not being murdered, or Fatty Arbuckle staging some unsavory scandal, the hi-jackers and quick-trigger gunmen are occupying the center of the stage.

We don't blame the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce objecting to the undesirable publicity it is getting. Nevertheless the news agencies should not be blamed. It is their job to publish the facts and if crimes elsewhere are reported, we see no reason why they should not be reported in the roaring Babylon of Southern California.

After all, the only way the American crime wave can be checked is by a general knowledge of its character, and the conditions which produce it. Suppressing crime news, instead of ameliorating the evil, merely increases it, for there is nothing the professional criminal desires more passionately than anonymity and freedom from the white light of publicity.

Suppressing crime news may be pleasant to those people who do not wish to face the truth, but such a procedure will not only retard the fight against the criminal, but increase the dangers to society, which organized and commercialized crime presents.

In this direction the newspapers of this country have an obvious public duty to perform. There is neither need, nor excuse, for over emphasizing the sordid details of any crime, or pandering in any way to a sensation-loving public.

But there is a need,—a great need,—for a complete, unbiased, uncolored report of the crime wave every day so that the American people may know precisely the conditions they face.

For when all is said and done, the only effective force against the criminal is an outraged and determined public opinion. And such a force can never be created, if the people are lulled into a sense of false security, by a distortion or suppression of the facts as they exist.

THE BATHING OBSESSION STRIKES IN In his interesting book, "Safari," Martin Johnson, wild game cinematographer, says that one day he asked his laboratory "boy" why he didn't take a bath, say once in six months. Johnson found the negro's body odor offensive in the warm room, and told him so. The black man answered, "Bwana, to the black man you smell too and very bad. Even the elephant not like your smell as much as black man's."

Will you kindly tell me how to evaporate 20 gallons of water in a dwelling having eight rooms, hot air heating.—Mrs. E. O. Answer.—I suppose you refer to the means of maintaining fair humidity in the winter time. That requires the evaporation of from 20 to 50 gallons of water each 24 hours in the average eight-room dwelling when the household temperature is kept at 68 degrees F. Much more water must be evaporated if the temperature is allowed to go higher. Equipment may be built in or installed by the plumber, to provide automatic control of water evaporation. The most satisfactory plan I know, that is not costly, is the use of humidifiers on each register or radiator. These humidifiers hold several gallons of water and evaporate it through a manifold of absorbent wicking suspended over and dipping in the water.

There are medical or surgical emergencies that sometimes demand enemas or bowel washes or colon irrigations or internal baths if you subscribe to the snide magazines. Yes, and there are emergencies that call for emetics, bleeding, narcotics and so on, but sane people, sensible folk, leave such matters to the physician and surgeons. This bowel washing business is a morbid belief, and notwithstanding temporary enthusiasm of the novice, under the influence of the skillful charlatan, the practice or habit of taking such injections is pretty sure to lead eventually to much worse conditions than the victims have to begin with. I shall not give any depressing details, but only assure you that the ultimate result of this unnatural treatment of the intestine is deplorable, a real malady instead of the fanciful ailment for which the irrigations are supposed.

To imagine that any such injections can "cleanse" the internal organs or even the lower bowel, is to confuse the facts with childlike credulity and no knowledge of actual anatomy and physiology. No one with a fair knowledge of human physiology can entertain any such silly notion for a moment. The main part of the patronage of these "colon filling stations" is derived from that portion of the population that scorns "pills and potions" yet likes to believe "poisonous" can be prevented or cured by other means. As a matter of fact, bowel washes are no more cleansing to the system than the ordinary physics are.

Please explain again how to give the castor oil.—Mrs. S. A. P. Answer.—I said that a dose of castor oil may prove dangerous if the trouble happens to be appendicitis. Any other cathartic would be just as harmful. The harm consists of stirring up the inflamed region and spreading the inflammation. Never give castor oil or other cathartic when there is any question of appendicitis.
