DRY OPPONENT OF SENATOR REED WINS MISSOURI

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Charles M. Hay, Missouri dry leader and bitter opponent of Senator James A. Reed, was apparently nominated today as democratic candidate for United States senator, as more than half the precincts had reported in the Missouri primary.

Hay had a lead of 12,125 votes over James A. Collet, a wet, whose candidacy was sponsored by Senator Reed, who is retiring from the senate after 18 years of service. The apparent defeat of Collet, however, was not regarded as a real test of Senator Reed's strength, as the former had entered politics only recently.

In the republican senatorial race, Roosevelt Patterson of Kansas City, was leading his nearest opponent, Nathan Frank, St. Louis lawyer, by 8,215.

LA GRANDE, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Two eye-witnesses to the shooting of George Parry in his barber shop Monday testified at the coroner's inquest last night that Parry was dozing in his chair when the assassin commenced firing.

Parry, it was said, jumped to his feet and staggered into the hotel sample room. Dr. V. L. Hamilton testified that he found Parry in a dying condition, but gave him stimulants which prolonged his life for nearly half an hour.

Dr. Hamilton and Dr. Gilstrap, who performed the autopsy on Parry's body, said only one of four bullet wounds were fatal, that one entering the right ventricle of the heart.

Witnesses agreed that no words were exchanged before or during the shooting.

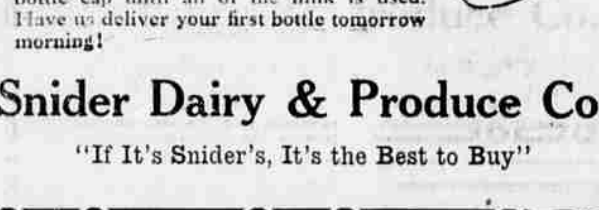
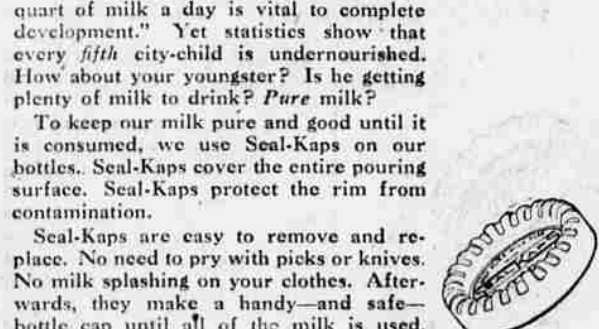

U. S. SENDS SHARP NOTE TO CHINA ON PROPERTY SEIZURE

SHANGHAI, China, Aug. 8.—(AP)—John Van A. MacMurray, American minister at Peking, has sent a note to the nationalist foreign minister, calling attention to the failure of the nationalist government to fulfill promises made on several occasions to evacuate all American property occupied by soldiers and officers, and to prevent further such occurrences.

The note says that despite promises by the nationalist government only a portion of such properties have been evacuated, and even additional property has been seized.

As a "few among many" exemplify the note instances the American church mission and nationalistic consulates at Nanking, the American Presbyterian missions, and properties at Hanchow, Tientsin and Szechow which are at present occupied by the Chinese.

The minister said that he had been informed that the occupation of additional properties at Nanking and at Chinkiang was contemplated and that American property was being treated as though America were an enemy country, making war against China, where as its full protection is an elementary responsibility of the Chinese government.

The American government, the note says, has displayed throughout the greatest forbearance, hoping that Chinese contractors would be made good. The country's reputation of American property, especially the United States consulate at Nanking, has created a very unfavorable impression throughout the world and painfully disappointed the American government.

Therefore, it is expected, the note continues, "in evidence of the good faith and political conscience of the nationalist government that no more American properties shall be occupied and that those already occupied be returned to the true use of their rightful owners."

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
