

BOURBON PAPERS IN SOUTH GIVE HOOVER SQ. DEAL

While the democratic press of the state and Pacific coast are editorially enlarging at great length upon the fishing trip of Herbert Hoover to Rogue river, and manifesting editorial wrath at his failure to accord a swarm of photographers drawing room courtesy, the San Antonio (Tex.) Light, published in the hotbed of democracy, deals with the matter in a conservative manner, with no attempt to manufacture political material injurious to the republican candidate.

Alongside a picture of Hoover dressed in his fishing togs, the "Light" remarks: "The republican nominee was constantly annoyed by people who frightened the fish."

The headline above the picture reads: "Now for the Fish Stories." The reading matter is "Herbert Hoover (below) in his speech of acceptance is just as all to tell his listeners about 'the big one that got away,' while he was fishing for trout in the Rogue river near Medford, Ore." The Rogue is spelled "cosmetically."

C. D. Woodward of Grants Pass has donated a swimming suit as second prize, and Larry Schade is giving a radium dial wrist watch as third prize.

The fourth prize will be a flashlight awarded by the Rogue River Hardware company of Grants Pass.

RELEASE GROWERS FROM BOSC PLAN FOR THIS YEAR

The Rose Pear committee has decided to release the growers who have subscribed to the 1928 plan for a wider distribution and advertisement of Rose pears.

A large percentage of the growers signed the contract prepared by the committee and of those who declined to sign and whose cooperation would have made up the required percentage many gave as a reason the opinion that it is now too late in the season to make the plan effective. In view of the committee is now inclined to join, and as the other objections to the plan were chiefly concerned with minor details, it is believed that by beginning earlier in 1929 it will be practicable to bring most of the growers into line for something to the manifest advantage of the Rogue River Valley.

Individual growers are suggesting meritorious ideas regarding advertising of pears in general and it is hoped that they will not be slow in advancing them for general discussion, for the need for advertising will be quite as pronounced in 1929 and later years as it appears to be in 1928.
