OFFER HUGE SUM FOR CAPTURE OF WOMAN'S SLAYER

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(AP)—"Unlimited funds" from the wealth of Evanston, North Shore suburb, have been pledged to aid police in an intensified search for the slayer of Miss Jennie Meta Constance, 42-year-old school teacher who was clubbed to death Tuesday night near Northwestern University campus.

A reward of \$1,000 was offered by Police Chief Pasch for the arrest of the slayer and \$1,000 additional for every person participating in the capture.

A negro with a "Charlie Chaplin mustache" was sought in connection with the slaying. The negro was seen in the vicinity of Foster street, where the body was found, telling stories to a group of boys Tuesday night.

Police learned that the man was about 28 years old and came from Flint, Mich.

Evanston, the home of Vice President Dawes, was shocked by the crime as citizens recalled the murder 15 years ago of Ida Leegson, art pupil of Lorado Taft, who was killed by a negro in a similar attack.

Miss Constance, who was head of the English department at Bradley Polytechnic Institute, Peoria, was clubbed to death with an iron pipe and attacked, her body being thrown under a hedge where the gleam of a milkman's lantern revealed it early yesterday.

Two suspects were taken into custody for questioning. One, Willis Wolfe, 37, is a fugitive from an insane asylum at Chipewau Falls, Wis. He told police a rambling and incoherent story about his escape from the asylum and his arrival in Evanston on Tuesday night, the night of the slaying.

The other suspect was John Burke, 45, of Evanston, who police said had been arrested previously for disorderly conduct.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—(AP)—James Warner, radio operator of the Southern Cross, on the flight to Australia, found his father here yesterday after a search of 29 years. Charles Warner, of Arlington, Ore., came here on receiving word that the radio operator was his son whom he had not seen since the boy was six years old, in Marion, Kansas.

Last Message of Dying U Boat Crew Stirs All Italy

POLA, Italy, Aug. 8.—(AP)—The last message sent by the telegraph operator aboard the submarine E-14 which was interrupted by death was:

"We are all gathered at the prow. Gas is advancing inex-

orably. We are dying. Long live

The bodies of the 27 victims of the disaster lie today in the largest room in the naval hospital which has been transformed into a chapel ardente and decorated with floral tributes, received not only from Pola but from the entire Italian peninsula.

Moving scenes occurred in the chapel when relatives of the victims insisted on giving a last tender embrace to the dead.
