Gilda Gray Dances In Craterian Film

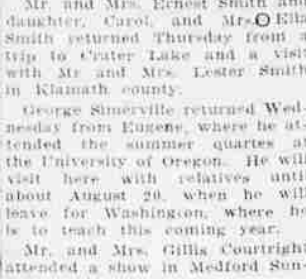
