

LEAGUE OF NATIONS TO DISCUSS PEACE TREATY FROM U. S. A.

GENEVA, Aug. 10.—(AP)—The Kellogg treaty outlawing war is likely to be discussed by the League of Nations assembly in September.

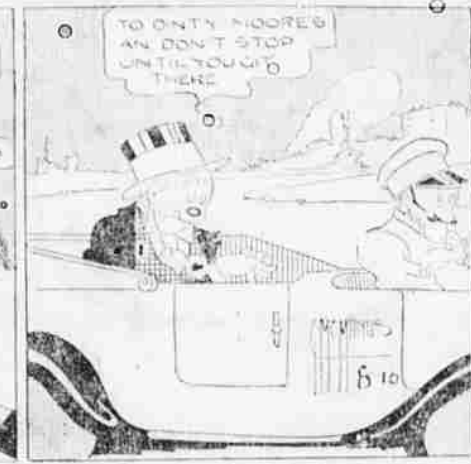
The pact was officially brought to the attention of the league by Great Britain as a "matter which is evidently one of general interest to all league members."

Discussion, it was thought, will cover the significance of the pact to the maintenance of international peace and as an encouragement to the reduction of armaments.

The British communication did not include the text of the Kellogg pact, but merely the text of British notes interpreting the proposal.

Britain remarked that communications to Washington make clear that there is no such conflict. The request was made that the British communication be sent to all members of the league because "the matter is evidently one of general interest to all league members."

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(AP)—The stock market opened strong today with most of the industrial shares showing material gain. Radio started with a block of 5000 shares at 17 1/2, a gain of 1/4 point. Montgomery Ward advanced to 19 1/2, a new year's high. St. Louis Southwestern common was up 2 points to 94 3/8, a record high price for all time. Gains of 1 to 2 points were shown by General Motors, the Chrysler, U. S. Steel, American Can, Consolidated Gas and Johns Manville.

Heavy accumulation of Chrysler Common and Dodge Bros. preferred, which advanced more than 5 points to new high records, contrasted with renewed liquidation of General Motors, which dropped from early high of 187 to 181 1/4. Radio fell from 17 1/2 to 17 and Wright Aeronautical from 15 1/2 to 15. Warner Bros. A. from 78 to 75 1/2 and Atlantic Refining from 157 to 154.

St. Louis Southwestern reached a new peak to 94 3/8.

Wheat Hearing Tomorrow. PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 10.—(AP) A hearing to ascertain the sentiment of Oregon wheat growers and dealers on grading wheat according to its protied content will be held at the office of State Market Agent Seymour Jones in the Multnomah county courthouse tomorrow at 10 a. m.

"This is an important question to Oregon wheat interests," said Jones today. "If this method of grading wheat should be adopted, it might have an important bearing on whether certain kinds of wheat should be graded No. 1 or No. 2."

OHIO SWEEP BY SEVERE STORMS; TRAIN WRECKED

ALLIANCE, Ohio, Aug. 10.—(AP) Severe electrical and rain storms that lashed diagonally across northern Ohio struck with full force near here last night, caused at least one death, resulted in the derailment of a Pennsylvania passenger train and damaged much property, according to meagre reports received here today. Disruption of communication hampered efforts to learn the full extent of the damage.

A washout near Sebring, four miles west of here, derailed the Pennsylvania passenger train No. 225, en route from Kennesaw, Minn. to Alliance, late last night. The engineer and fireman were slightly injured and more than 20 passengers were shaken up. Three of the eight coaches and the locomotive left the track.

Four-year-old William Harms was struck by lightning and killed during the storm, which blew down more than 100 telephone lines. Lightning set fire to four homes in the Sebring vicinity.

Wins By Vocal Chords. AMSTERDAM, Aug. 10.—(AP)—John L. Haley of Washington, Minn., reached the final round of the bantamweight competition in the Olympic championships today with the aid of the loud voices of the spectators, many of them Americans. The spectators roared so loud when the verdict was given to his rival, Isaac of South Africa, in the semi-final that the decision was reversed.

Forest Fire in Lane Co. EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Burning over an area of 1000 acres, a fire was beyond control today in the Deschutes national forest, just east of the Lane county line.

An appeal for 50 men to fight the fire was sent to Nelson F. MacDuff, of the Cascade National forest.
