

# SELLING STOCK WITH CIGARETS IS FORBIDDEN

SALISBURY, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Acting on a complaint filed by the Oregon Retail Tobacco Dealers' association, State Corporation Commissioner McCullister has issued an order that the Union Tobacco company of New York shall quit giving away in this state a fractional share of stock in the company with each 27 carton of cigarettes purchased. In exchange for 200 of the fractional certificates the company agreed to give one paid up share.

The issuance of the fractional certificates purported to be an inducement to buy cigarettes, but the retail dealers claim that four other stable brands of cigarettes are sold at 16 a carton, indicating that the Union Tobacco company is really engaged in a stock selling campaign.

The order of the commissioner gives the company opportunity to comply with the blue sky law of the state.

# FEAR OF TROUBLE IN JUGO SLAVIA AREA PROVES UNFOUNDED

VIENNA, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Widely held apprehension that the death of Stefan Raditch, Croatian peasant leader, would precipitate immediate troubles in Jugoslavia thus far has signally failed of realization.

Peace and order has prevailed generally in the triple-kingdom and the expectation now is that this condition will continue at least until after the funeral services on Sunday at Zagreb, ancient capital of Croatia.

There were reports that the Belgrade government had been informed by the peasant-democratic coalition that participation in the services of government representatives, or of those of political parties supporting the Belgrade parliament, was unwelcome.

The government decided that Raditch should have a state funeral at the government's expense but the peasant party made provisions for the ceremonies out of their own treasury and declined the government's offer.

McCoy has the reputation of knowing more about the American Indians than any other living white man. His pictures corroborate this statement.

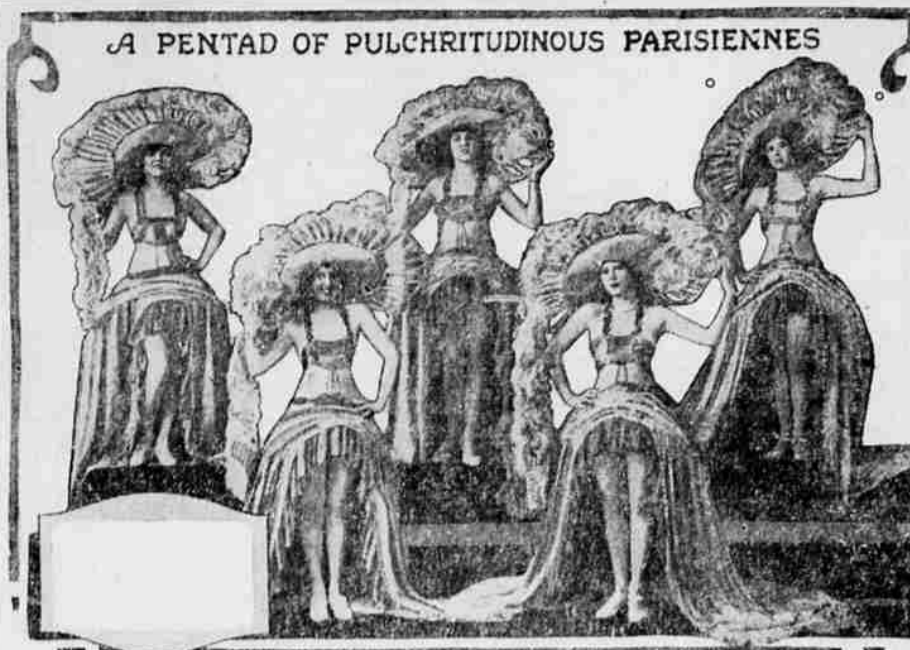

# STRANGE MONSTER ERECT MONUMENT ACTUALLY CAUGHT FOR COW THAT NEAR VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 10.—(AP) Stories of "Ogopogo," a strange sea monster said to inhabit Okanagan lake, and of a similar creature in the waters near Vancouver were given some credence today with the capture yesterday of a strange fish near here.

The creature, about six feet long was described as having a head resembling that of a sheep and a body like an eel. It was caught by the son of Harry Alexander, Vancouver magistrate, while trolling in Long Bay, Bannier Island. He turned it over to provincial police.

For the past two years from Okanagan lake, in interior British Columbia, have come tales of a strange sea serpent, usually said to be about 20 feet long. Its description, except for size, tallied with that given by police for young Alexander's catch. Several times persons who reported seeing "Ogopogo" have told of his traveling through the water with great speed.

More recently several reports of a similar sheep-headed monster have come from Howe Sound, near Vancouver.

CARNATION, Wash.—(AP)—A monument to a champion milk cow, Segie Pieterte Prosser, which produced 57 tons of milk in her 12 years of life, was unveiled here recently.

The statue, one-fourth larger than life size, was designed by E. W. Potter, noted animal sculptor, and stands on Carnation farm where the cow was kept. Prospect died of old age in 1925.

Her first record was made in 1922 when she produced 37,381 pounds of milk and 1448 pounds of butter in 365 days. Her record for two years' production was 72,931 pounds of milk and 2865 pounds of butter.

During her lifetime it is estimated Prospect produced 174,000 pounds, or 41,000 quarts of milk, about 160 times her own weight. The average milk production per cow in the United States is 2900 pounds or 1450 quarts a year.

Only two of Prospect's offspring are living. The first calf, a bull, is on Carnation farm. A heifer

**Undulant Fever—A New Disease in Oregon**

There have recently come to the attention of the State Board of Health several cases of undulant fever, a disease hitherto unknown, or at least unrecognized, in this state. The term undulant fever is applied to this disease because it is characterized by waves of fever lasting a week or so alternating with periods of several days when there is no, or little fever. Undulant fever is also known as Malta fever, because the disease was first observed on the island of Malta in the Mediterranean sea. There, as well as in other parts of the world where Malta fever occurred, human infection was traceable to the use of goat's milk. In this country undulant fever has been largely contracted by the use of milk from cows that had prematurely lost their young, a condition known as "contagious abortion." The few cases discovered in Oregon drank milk from cattle that were known to be aborted. The germ causing Malta fever, *Bacillus Maltensis*, can be distinguished only with the greatest difficulty from the germ causing contagious abortion, *Bacillus Abortus*.

Contagious abortion in cattle presents a serious problem not only in the health hazards offered to the consumers of raw milk, but also in the tremendous loss in dollars and cents to the dairy industry of this state. Dr. W. H. Lytle, State Veterinarian, estimates "at from five to ten per cent of the herds of the Willamette valley are infected with the germ causing contagious abortion, and that the loss to the dairymen is easily over one and a half million dollars annually.

Undulant fever has often been mistaken for typhoid fever, particularly where the disease has been of a milk type. Danish authorities assert that there are more cases of undulant than typhoid fe-

ver in Denmark. The number of cases of undulant fever has increased remarkably in the United States in the past year because of correct diagnosis of the disease.

The chief symptoms of the disease are loss of appetite, loss of weight, marked weakness, headache, chills, fever, profuse sweating, and frequently pain in the joints. The average duration of the illness from the onset to convalescence is three months, but cases lasting a year or longer are not at all rare. The mortality is very low. The germ may be found in the blood stream and in the urine. In suspected cases blood for agglutination test should be submitted to the State Hygienic Laboratory. All cases of undulant fever should be reported to the State Board of Health. The patient should be kept in modified quarantine, and all sanitary precautions employed in the control of intestinal diseases should be applied to undulant fever.

The existence of undulant fever in Oregon is another argument for the pasteurization of milk in rural communities where pasteurizing plants are not available, milk from infected cows should be boiled before drinking.
