Freight rates are so high in the Rogue River valley that the people there can only deal in cream," declares Dr. J. F. Reddy of Medford, registered at the Imperial and attending the cross-state railroad hearing. "Only the cream of the fruit, the cream of the timber, the cream of the minerals can be shipped out. Fruit, which would be first class on the market of Portland, is kept at home, for only the very highest quality can be shipped. The same is true of timber. Only the richest ore can be sent to smelters. Copper ore in unlimited quantities is available, but, because of freight rates, low-grade ores cannot be transported, so that nothing except the high grade can go out. Lower rates would mean increased volume of ore, but inasmuch as there is no competition, it isn't human nature for a man or a transportation company to give up a cinch."
