TWO FIRES ARE SPOTTED FROM MT. M'LAUGHLIN

All of the lookouts in the Crater National Forest have been vigilant in action, as from their elevated stations they scan all day long about the region about their stations to spot forest fires.

However, the ace of the Crater National forest lookouts is J. F. H. Cone, lookout on Mount McLaughlin, or PHT as it is more commonly known, who at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon discovered a fire on state land near Wolf Creek in Josephine county, a distance of 58 miles away, which evidently was a large one, as it made much smoke.

To further accentuate the quality of Cone's vision, even after he had reported this fire, the lookout at Battle Rock mountain, who is stationed many miles closer to the location of the fire, was unable to see it.

At once, after he had discovered the fire, Cone notified the Crater National forest headquarters office here by phone, and in turn that office notified District State Fire Warden Hoyle of Grants Pass. Nothing had been heard yet today as to the extent of this fire.

The single-crested Cone again came to the front at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon, by first discovering and reporting a fire burning in brush on state land about two miles out of Grants Pass.

Another fire burning over four or five acres of yellow pine timber near Pinehurst, this county, but which is under the jurisdiction of the Klamath Pine Protective association, was spotted by the lookout on Old Baldy mountain, of the Crater National forest, at 1:55 p. m. yesterday, who notified the headquarters office in Medford, which in turn sent the news on to the proper officials in Klamath Falls. No report has since been received in Medford as to the condition of this fire.

About 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon a fire was reported at the headquarters office in Medford as burning along Indian creek near the Crater lake highway, three miles south of Trail, but it did not amount to much, as 10 minutes later a phone message was received that it was out.
