## YANKEE ATHLETES DEFEAT BRITISH BY SLIM MARGIN

Associated Press Sports Editor STAMFORD BRIDGE, ENGLAND, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The United States, with the pick of its Olympic track and field talent, barely beat the British empire's combine forces this afternoon in a meet marked by one world's record and a rapid succession of other sensational performances.

Fifty-five thousand spectators, many of whom collapsed from the combined effects of the sun and the broiling sun, witnessed the triumph of the Americans by the narrow margin of eight to six, first places only figuring in the scoring.

The Yankee one-mile team registered the most sensational American triumph on the track when a quartet consisting of George Baird, Morgan Taylor, Ray Barbuti, and Emerson Spencer covered the distance in 3 minutes 12 2/5 seconds, shattering the world's record by three seconds.

## UNFAIR CHARGES HURLED OLYMPIC BOXING CONTESTS

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Amid scenes of wild disorder the Olympic boxing championships closed tonight with Italy and Argentina tied for the team title.

Italy scored three firsts and one third and Argentina two firsts and two seconds and the Olympic committee decided to award the team championship to either one at the expense of the other. The United States, defending champion, ranked third with two seconds and a third, and Holland was fourth with one first and one third.

In the opinion of ringside experts, Argentina deserved to rank first because of what were termed unfair decisions in two of the final bouts tonight. In the featherweight class, Van Kleeveren of Holland, was given the decision over Perata of Argentina, although experts at the ringside considered the Argentine had won decisively.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Climaxing a week of triumph in Amsterdam's spacious pool, aquatics of the United States today scored up the Olympic water competition with five victories in the final six events on the program.

For the first time since emulsions or lack of them—brought into the supremacy American athletes always have held in the man-to-man phases of the Olympic competition, one member of the United States athletic army lived up to all the nice things that had been said about it before hand.

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## EUGENE TELLS OF RAILROAD NEEDS TO EAST OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Hal F. Wiggins, rate and traffic expert of the public service commission of Oregon, introduced elaborate exhibits of detailed statistical analysis of traffic on Oregon lines in his testimony here today before the interstate commerce commission's hearing on the request of Oregon interests for an order directing the building of a cross-state line from Crane to Crescent Lake.

In his final summary, Mr. Wiggins presented the gist of the masses of statistics and indicated that there would be sufficient business for the proposed railroad if it should be constructed.

Eugene was represented at today's session by some of its leading citizens, J. E. Shelton, president of the chamber of commerce, Elmo Chase, vegetable grower, P. M. Morse, county engineer for Lane county, and Dr. Warren D. Smith of the University of Oregon all testified in support of the proposed line.

Mr. Shelton reviewed Eugene's growth and its need of closer contact with eastern Oregon. Mr. Chase said railroad developments in central western Oregon had opened new markets and brought increases in his business. Mr. Morse presented figures on timber stands in Lane county and outlined a route from Crescent Lake to western Oregon. Dr. Smith sketched the geological formation of cen-

tral and eastern Oregon and gave the opinion that artesian wells would supply water for irrigation in many sections.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Attorney General Van Winkle has examined petitions recently filed with the secretary of state for organization of the socialist-labor party in Oregon and pronounced them legal. The law requires that the petitions be signed by not less than 5 per cent of the legal voters of the state.
