

ART SCHOOL IN ASHLAND TO BE REGULAR FEATURE

ASHLAND, Aug. 14.—(Special.) At a meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce on Thursday, it was voted to continue cooperation with the Ashland Summer Art school that has just closed a very successful season and to make every effort to support the school for extended activity for next year.

Miss Editha Carson, her niece Miss Lucile Carson, and nephew, Donald Carson, have returned from Ashland, where they have spent several weeks with their brother and uncle, O. F. Carson. Miss Lucile will go with the Campfire Girls for their summer session at Lake of the Woods.

The Ashland Summer Art school brought the 1928 session to a successful close on Friday night when the people of Rogue River valley were asked to view an exhibit of work that was representative of the courses offered. Landmark work in oil was unusually interesting, as the scenes were bits of Ashland landscape on the Junior high school grounds and in Lillia park. The poster division in tempera called forth much favorable criticism.

Art appreciation was given for the first time this year and was amply represented by artistic notebooks showing various influences in art and architecture. Pieces of batik fashioned into wall hangings were very colorful notes in the display.
